#### VP VOLTAGE—MAINTENANCE MONTH

Greetings from the garage. Hope your summer activities have included some fun things to do. Turns out my August activities have included some unexpected maintenance on my car (yes, I know it happens to everyone sometime ©). Had a great July with family visits and driving, but recently had a couple of events with the car that have me in the garage working unexpectedly on the convertible.

First off, have you ever done something stupid? Rhetorical question I know 'cause we all have at some point, but at least the one I recently did didn't kill or maim anyone ©. So, at the end of July I attended the car show put on by Rosie's Diner here in Monument. Had a great time, and all was well when I backed the car into the garage after the show. Fast forward to a week or so afterwards when I went to start the car and drive it around. Put the key in, turned the switch, and, nothing. No starter sound or anything. Dead. Checked the battery and it was charged. Since I have heard of ignition switches going bad, that's what I assumed it was since the starter cranked when using a remote starter. Cranked just fine. So, found a spare switch from Mike, drove up there to pick it up and installed it. Of course, same result. Now is where the realization of "stupid" comes in as I looked up to the gear selector lever on my Power-



glide transmission lever and (you guessed it), it was in Reverse..... Why I hadn't moved it the u-joint retainer. Stupid event to Neutral before trying to start it, #2. It's not normal to see a universal joint bearing cap on the floor, so my interest was piqued at this. I pushed the car back into the driveway and jacked up the rear end to observe that one of the bearing cap retainers on the yoke was missing and the left universal joint was off the differential yoke. This is a big deal and I'm

very lucky that it didn't come off while I was tooling down the freeway or highway. In tracing back events that lead up this this, I have to conclude that during the installation of this engine/ transmission into the car when I bought it, one of the lock washers was not installed when bolting in "bad things come in threes" rule is not going to kick in for me in the near future ©. So, now I'm in the process of fixing the ujoint to get the car running again and back out on the road.

Hopefully, the rest of the summer and fall will be better, and I won't have to have another maintenance month ahead. #### TECH TIP: OVERLOOKED LUBE PLACES

Is your door difficult to close after being fully opened? There is a stop built into the lower hinge that allows the door to stay open as you get in or out of the car. The piece is spring loaded and places a heavy load against the stop as the door is brought back into closed position. IT NEEDS TO BE LUBRICATED ON A REGULAR BASIS!!

The 65-66 cars seem to be the worse for needing this little dab of maintenance. The hinge is poorly cast metal and the spring will break the pin it swivels on. When the spring falls off, then the door will no longer stay open on its own.

On all models you should shoot a little bit of aerosol lube or even WD-40 onto the hinges and around the springs at least a couple of times a year.


In addition to normal ball joint/tie rod ends and idler arm (if fixed with grease zerks) use a rubber/ vinyl lube such as Armor-all or similar on sway bar bushing/sway bar hanger bushings as well as the front strut rod bushings.

Same on rear suspension bushings, and use a spray lube such as WD-40 or other lube on E-

Particular attention is needed on the sheath/housing that the brake cable passes through.

If you remove the tunnel covers under the car, then lube the pulleys and shifter linkage too. If you feel agile, shoot a bit of lube on the pulleys under the dash too. A little WD-40 or similar in door locks and/or keys before inserting in ignition and glove box works too. Just a couple of times a year on all of the above is enough too.
