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PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS

Hi all!

Still busy... Two major activities taking time this month. One was another salvage yard adventure with Charlie Beets (Rick's son) and a week-long trip with folks from the City of Westminster to check out some sites in Colorado, heavily related to some unique railroads. Along the way I did manage the 9-11 stair climb at Red Rocks Amphitheater (9 laps of the seating bowl), I finished nailing the last bits of trim in place for our house refurbishing effort, and the bathroom contractor asked for a month delay due to worker shortages so I didn't need to tear out underlayment a day after our vacation. You'll notice there is not a lot of direct Corvair activity except for the salvage yard adventure which turned out to be considerable even though there was not much I "needed."

The salvage adventure with Charlie came about when the president of the CCCC discovered a '65 Corsa at You Pull & Pay in Aurora. Some of you probably saw the various emails about the car. The pictures showed a fairly complete car in useable condition. I've done something like major salvage work on three cars before, so I have a pile of tools I take and a list of what to look for. John Kull needed some parts for a PG to 4-speed conversion and Paul Seyforth was looking for a front sway bar and the links. There were some things I could use, or I thought



others could use. As Steve Goodman tells me, "You can't save every car" but I also hate to see potentially useful items like transmissions and differentials become rebar. A Corsa also has some unique trim items and there are general items like door latch and window regulator pieces that can be useful.

Charlie did some recon on the car because he needed some bits for other customer cars he was working on. On the big day I went to the wrong yard because I failed to read an email thoroughly but when I did find the car there were many parts in the original photos that were already taken. I gathered up some stuff like trunk mats in the area to put under the car so I was not lying directly on broken glass. I got a number of parts for John immediately. The car had pretty significant front-end damage underneath (the drag link was bent into a frown) so the front suspension was not viable. The driver's side rocker was ripped loose from the floor of the car. I picked away on the car and got the rest of the parts available that John could probably use. By the time we got there the doors were gone in their entirety, the seats were gone, the dash was gone in the photos and the glove box door was gone. I

did end up with some spare items like the windshield wiper linkage and motor and some door sills and one piece of rocker trim that is better than mine. We got the rear window because it might be tinted. When I got it home and cleaned it up, it was not tinted so I'm still on the hunt for a tinted rear window for a coupe.

Ultimately, I spent two long Saturdays and two short Sundays in hot weather. I ended up with the transaxle and the clutch cover, clutch disc and flywheel, and some miscellaneous trim items. The engine was left on the ground under the car in the event Charlie wanted it. He also got some parts he could potentially use for Corvair projects he is working on. He was a big help and it's always good to have company. I was also the tool crib for a group of fellow salvagers at times. Really a pretty decent group of folks. I say this a lot but I'm getting to the point where this stuff is not as easy so I'm happy to be a coach in person but would prefer not to be a heavy wrench operator.

Regarding the 9-11 stair climb, I was uncertain about my ability to complete all 9 laps due to lack of time to train climbing stairs at Westminster Rec center, but I went anyway. I ran into a friend I've climbed with before but did not contact because I was unsure I would make it. It was a nice day, and the crowd was about as big as usual but I did not see a

number of people I've worked with and climbed with in the past. As in past years there were many firefighters in bunker gear with SCBAs and tools. I achieved all 9 laps. As usual, this is a moving experience.

Our train travels started less than 24 hours after the stair climb so I was pretty stiff. It started on 9-12 and we were home on 9-16. Since this is getting long, here are the highlights: We were on a tour bus between venues. I think the driver was enjoying himself in particular during the canyon run from Salida to Canyon City. We started out in Glenwood Springs for cave tours and hot tubs. Next was Ouray where we did an open jeep tour (complete with rain) over the Corkscrew trail to Silverton. Then we rode the train to Durango. The engine was a narrow-gauge diesel. Next was the bus to Chama NM to ride the Cumbres & Toltec narrow -gauge train to Antonio, CO with a lunch stop in Osier, CO. This is a long ride and very scenic. We had a coal fired steam engine followed by an oil-fired steam engine. They would uncouple the first engine to reduce weight when crossing the bridges. From Antonio we went to Alamosa, and then to Canyon City to ride the train in the Royal Gorge. Then off to Colorado Springs where we toured the Cave of the Winds and rode the Pike's Peak Cog Rail. The new visitors center is really nice. Ultimately we ended back where we started from.

TECH TIP: WINTER IS ON THE WAY

Fall is in the air which means winter

isn't far behind.
Winter means
crummy road conditions which can
curtail our interest
in driving our
shiny cars. I don't



drive my nice cars on snow/slush/ mag-chloride treated roads and certainly none of us should treat our nice cars that way. Rust and corrosion are hard to beat back.

On the other hand our cars suffer from non-use. Fuel systems and brakes are the two worst problem areas. Luckily we have enough nice weather between the bad spells when the roads are dry and temps are mild. That is the time to give your car some exercise. It only takes 15-20 miles of driving to warm up the engine and gearbox and wheel bearings plus of course doing a lot of stopping around traffic.

Getting engine to temperature dries out the exhaust system as well as circulating the oil and filtering the hot oil. Many times the heater gets some use too during the drive. Watch your tire pressures during the winter months too. Even in a garage the cold tends to drop the psi

just a bit. Same with battery, if used at least once or twice every month through the cold season you should not need battery tender etc. A good battery will hold a charge for a couple of months with no use at all.

Hopefully your oil change and tuneup schedule is good. I always suggest keeping your fuel close to full during the winter time too. After a couple of drives 'fill er up' but only to automatic nozzle shutoff, NOT to running out of the filler neck. Your garage will have a fuel smell for a while if that happens.

Lastly the common warning: DO NOT just run your car for 15 minutes in your driveway. The engine does not warm up and the brakes aren't used and the bearings in the transaxle as well as wheel bearings do not turn and steering linkage is not used. Your car gets NO exercise by doing that.

DRIVE YOUR CORVAIR when weather and roads permit.

As you all know, my Corvair decided at the end of July to 'give up' while driving on the free-way in Colorado Springs heading toward the Cripple Creek Show. 


