cussed © this before earlier this year in April when I talked about Congress trying to pass the Sunshine Protection Act (passed by the Senate unanimously and dying in the House) that would make daylight savings time permanent across the US next year. As happens in our government, sometimes nothing happens in our government. So come November 6th, we once again get to "fall back" an hour, and gain back that hour of sleep we lost earlier this year. Normally, a catalytic converter doesn't cost a tremendous amount, but thanks to our neighbor to the west, California and their California Air Resource Board (CARB) draconian requirements, that has changed. You say what does California have to do with Colorado? Well, our illustrious Colorado legislature and government has adopted their CARB requirement, along with 3 other states. This results in repair shops having to install CARB Certified catalytic converters when they replace them. So, what does that cost, you say? Well, here is the

shocker price quote we received.
Ready? Fortunately, I was sitting down, but the price was \$3,800 out the door.

TECH TIP: UNUSUAL NOISES

If we have been driving our Corvair for any length of time we know the 'normal' noises that the engine makes or road noises from tires. How about when a strange noise pops up?

A rattle inside the car when finding a ripple in the road or worse a pothole or manhole cover, usually points to something in the instrument panel/ash tray or radio mountings becoming loose. While driving on open road, reach around and push against the area where the noise is coming from. You may need help if it's coming from the rear or passenger side. Check the glove box for things rattling against each other, and also under the seats for something rolling around. Push against the ash tray too, it is common to hear it rattling. Plus there may be car wash quarters stored inside. For most of the fasteners around the dash a small Phillips screwdriver will fit everything. Actually it is kinda fun to just start gently tightening every screw head visible in the instrument panel/heater control and glove box door.

Instead of inside the car, the noise you hear could be from the front or rear under the car. Shock mounts/sway bar bushings are most common in the front. Of course a worn balljoint or suspension bushing can also make noises when hitting bumps, etc. Noises in the rear are suspension bushings most of the time. In particular the inner strut rod bushing on 65-9 cars. If it's a 65 car with the original style rear engine mount, the mount could have failed and the mount has bottomed against the rear frame of the car. If transmission mounts or the mount on 66-9 are failing there can be noises too, because the rear suspension is mounted to the powertrain and those same parts can cause noise in the early cars too. Loose/worn shock mounts in the rear will rattle/clunk too on every year. Another noise-

maker in the rear of every year is exhaust system moving around, as well as spare tire being loose on the bracket or even things stored inside spare tire or along side battery

If you hear a clicking sound from rear as you coast to a traffic light that slows as the car slows, and of course it stops clicking when car stops moving, that is typical indication of a worn U-joint. On early cars and all FC it can also point to a worn axle flange. This flange is at end of axle and U-joint is attached to it. The flange is a very tight fit to the end of the axle by a spline plus bolt/washer in the end of the axle. The flange can come loose from wear from the axle and start moving around. To check this, the car must be in the air and then try to move the end of the axle up/down and watch for movement either at the flange or the U-joint assembly. For 65-9 cars there are 2 U-joints per side, but noise as well as checking is same as above. It's very seldom, but it can happen that the bolts holding the Ujoint straps in place can come loose or break if not the correct bolt. A quick check for tightness is never a waste of time.

If a grind/squeal noise happens as your stick shift car clutch is engaged from a stop either forward or reverse, that typically is the pilot

bushing becoming dry in the end of the crankshaft. The only cure is to remove the engine or powertrain and replace the bushing along with any ques-



tionable clutch parts and the input shaft seal inside the release bearing shaft. The pilot bushing is oilite bronze and must be oiled before installing in the crank.

Watch for chapter 2 next month.

AN INTERVIEW WITH A CORVAIR


I read this article in the October, 2022 edition of The Four Wheel Independent, the newsletter of the Central Pennsylvania Corvair Club (CPCC). I enjoyed it so much I reached out to their editor who graciously shared it us. This was written by CPCC member Paul Miller.

Very First Interview with a CORVAIR!!!

The interview was terminated when a software bug was detected & the Corvair's battery inexplicably went dead.


