

TECH TIP: UNUSUAL NOISES, PART 2

Last month several noises that are not normal were listed. Here are several others you might want to listen for.



If you have a stick shift Corvair and hear a rattle at idle in neutral that goes away when clutch pedal is pushed down a bit, the cause is almost always a loose flywheel. Stock flywheels are 3 pieces riveted together and the rivets come loose with age and use. The only cure is to replace with bolted or welded or solid flywheel. If noise happens when clutch is pushed down, then typically that is dry release (throw out) bearing. Again, the only fix is replacing the bad part. Either of these require removal of the engine or complete drivetrain. A powerglide equipped car can have a rattle/ratcheting sound from the torque converter being loose on the flex plate, or the flex plate is cracked. This is not the most common of failures but certainly has happened.

If a head loses its' torque a head gasket will fail by burning through the thin head gasket ring. The noise is a puffing sound in a rhythm as engine is idling it most likely is the head gasket leaking. It can be caused by a head stud that has pulled from the case too. If caught early enough the head can be re-torqued but if ignored, or if stud

has pulled then head must be removed and proper repairs done. Of course the engine is not running on 6 cylinders either so repairs should be done quickly. Another cause of puffing can be an exhaust leak but the engine will run on all 6 cylinders.

Stick shift gear box noises come in two places; the transmission and differential.

TRANSMISSION: The typical transmission noise is in the reduction gears and whether a 3 speed or 4 speed the noise is gone in high gear. The cause is the countergear roller bearings and subsequent wear to he countergear shaft. If noise is in all gears then the mainshaft bearings are usually worn. If the gears clash during a shift change, then either the clutch is not releasing properly OR the brass synchronizer rings are worn. Remember it is imperative to use GL-4 gear lube only in stick shift Corvairs. Also finding good synchro rings can be a search.

DIFFERENTIAL: If the noise is present during a 'coast' (meaning no throttle down) and becomes quiet during the opposite by being on the throttle, then the usual first place to think about is wear between the pinion gear and ring gear. The presence of 'power' pushes the pinion into the ring gear and much less noise is the result. This noise is usually caused by lack of gear



lube in the differential causing wear on rear (against the engine) pinion bearing thus resulting in wear of the gears. If your car has a posi-traction (locker) differential carrier and there is noise as the car is turned usually tightly in corners/parking then the usual culprit is the clutches in the posi are making the noise. Sometimes the incorrect gear lube may be to blame and sometimes just wear of the clutch pack. Changing the gear lube and ensuring the gear lube has the correct additives for the posi unit are important and sometimes will quiet a noisy posi. Needless to say it is important to use the correct gear lube and check the level at least once a year. Check more often if there is gear lube leaking on your garage floor. Obviously as always fixing the leaks is the most important repair and cheaper than rebuilding either transmission or the differential.

I have saved the most common noise until last, a tapping/clicking/clacking coming from the engine, usually when started cold and having sat for a while without running. Even though the noise can be ominous it goes away either within a minute or two or in some cases after a few minutes of running/driving down the neighborhood street. The noise is a rocker arm that is loose because the lifter has bled down (oil drained from it) by sitting and the pre-load

adjustment is absent. If gentle driving a few minutes makes it quiet then it is a normal Corvair engine. If it refuses to go away then the engine should be checked for worn rocker arm/poor quality lock nut on a rocker arm stud or possibly a lifter that will just refuse to pump with oil. The noise can also be a warning that the oil is thin or dirty and time to be changed.

Needless to say there are other places and parts in our cars that can make noise. The bottom line to all of the above is paying attention to the noises your Corvair is making and almost always with a good maintenance schedule many can be found and adjusted/repaired without huge repair costs and down time.




TRUNK OR TREAT










The Coupe had a spooky purple cat and witch theme. We found small containers of play doh to hand out as treats—those were a HUGE hit!

A French Company Resurrected the Chevy Corvair That You Can Buy

The Chevrolet Corvair, produced from 1960 to 1969, has always been one of GM's most controversial cars. It was also one of its most ambitious, with its air-cooled six-cylinder engine in the rear. Corvairs have mostly evaporated from the auto scene as classics, muscle cars, and sports cars take the forefront in collectors' eyes. But, incredibly, a company in France has completed a contemporary version of the 1965 to 1969 Corvair and has plans to start making them in Orange County, California.

Who makes the Corvair and is it a real Corvair?



The company is called NewRide, owned by Romain Roulleou, in Burgundy Dijon. It has been long in the works and was scheduled to debut at the 2020 SEMA Show, which was canceled over COVID restrictions. Other delays and projects pushed it off until this year when it made its debut this week at SEMA in Las Vegas.

The Corvair 2020 is a contemporary, reimagined Corvair, from the original design by Ron Hill. Its crisp, clean design and signature airy top resulted in one of GM's best designs of the mid-1960s. But by the time it debuted in 1965, the Corvair was in the crosshairs of

consumer advocates like Ralph Nader for the first version's sometimes scary handling.

What is the Corvair's body made of?

Though the Corvair's body is made completely out of carbon fiber, it is placed over a sixth-gen Camaro. In this case, it is a 2018 Camaro SS. That means, unfortunately, the engine is not in the rear as in the original. But with the weight bias to the rear of original cars, this might be a good thing.

While the windshield is stock Camaro, the rest of the glass is custom-made. The only OEM pieces are the VW Polo mirrors, Dodge Demon headlights, and Ferrari 812 Superfast taillights. Alcantara and custom carbon fiber bits upgrade the basically stock 2018 Camaro interior. NewRide has also chosen to use carbon fiber for the headlight surrounds, and bumpers, as opposed to chrome as with the original Corvair.

What engine does it run?

The engine is the factory 6.2-liter LT1 V8, with custom stainless steel exhaust added. EBC brake rotors replace the stock versions, and the suspension is upgraded with Air-Lift Performance components. Vossen EVO wheels run 19-inch fronts and 20-inch rears. Michelin Sport Cup 2 tires hit the pavement.

In all, the project took 5,600 hours to complete, which is an astronomical amount of time. But with molds, five-axis milling of components and panels, and flaying, then reskinning the Camaro, it is a time-consuming process. For series production, we expect that number to fall sharply.

THE NEW CORVAIR

When and where will it be made?

NewRide has already set up plans for production in Orange County and has other body styles to prototype. They include a convertible, and a sport wagon version. The convertible should be an easy variant. But the wagon will require still more custom glass and a reworked back half.

No prices or availability have been announced. In any case, once the operation is up and running we'll take a peek as they're in our backyard.
