TECH TIP: COLD WEATHER TIPS

Credit for this tip goes to the late Walter Hunertmark. He found creative ways to fix problems and modify things that many of us would never think of.

Adjusting the correct tension of the thermostats can be easy or painstaking. If you miss the adjustment of the rod length then it is unhook the swivel and adjust the length and try again. Walter solved this by slotting the bottom sheet metal so the thermostat and bracket could be moved back and forth without removing anything. The key to doing this is using the 61-62 thermostat bracket because there are two nut plates welded to the bracket and machine screws hold the bracket in place on the tin shroud. Later engines all used rivets to secure the brackets.

Note the pic of me just holding the bracket and you can see (or take my word for it) that nut plates are present.





The second pic shows the slots Walter cut in the shroud. This is the tin from my 67 coupe shop/work car that Walter owned for many years. I was doing some service work before winter this year and when I saw the slots I remembered him doing it. In fact Walter may have written the above tip himself a long time ago for the DRIPLINE. It still bears repeating with so many new members and thank you Walter.

Oh, my 'correct and or proper' adjustment of the thermostats are having just

enough tension to have doors closed when cold. Not tight, just closed. Remember too the flaps on early engines behind oil cooler and under cool should be bent upward to allow some warm air into the engine bay to prevent icing and some early cars have removable 'summer/winter plates' and all 65-9 have that plate on oil cooler side. That plate should be removed and turned over and use same screw to re-attach during cold times. Cover hole again when it turns springtime. One last note: the driver side door will open first, that is normal. And when very cold the pass side may not open at all unless on highway for a length of time.

MORE WINTER REMINDERS

IF you use your Corvair during winter months check wiper blades/washer solvent/tire tread and air pressure/battery terminals/oil change?-suspension lube?/ heater control cable movement/heater motor.

Under car look at heater hoses as well as checking for oil leaks and thermostats to aid in warmup as well as good heater operation. Also look at condition of battery terminal cable clamps and if questionable clean now instead of having the car not starting on a cold day. Normal check things include belt and look at top of engine for oil leakage and fuel leakage too. Oil and fuel fumes make bad smells in the passenger cabin. Walk around your Corvair and check every light. Look at lens on headlites, if badly sanded/frosted by gravel replace the seal beams now, nice bright light is nice winter and summer too. Make sure brake and turn signals all work too. Do a bit of lubrication in various key tumblers and also lube the door hinges and latches.

Try to keep fuel tank towards full and especially if you are parking the car for a while. Even if you park the Corvair for periods of time during winter/bad road conditions we have lots of opportunities here to exercise our Corvairs when the sun shines and roads are dry. Using your Corvair for only a short drive every couple of weeks or so will guarantee less trouble when spring arrives and it is time to drive more.

Your Corvair can be used in the wintertime with little issues if it is maintained.

Longest serving editor (?) retires

Jim Pittman, editor of Corvairs of NM since 1976, has retired from that volunteer job.

Below is his story of as it appeared in The CNM newsletter. He gave permission for me to share with club members. He might be the longest serving editor in CORSA history?

He and wonder wife Heula are two that I have looked forward to seeing at every meet since the 1996 CORSA National Convention CNM hosted in 1996.

As stated in the September 2023 newsletter, I have resigned from the position of newsletter editor. The August 2023 newsletter was my last. I became editor of the Corvairs of New Mexico newsletter with the January/February 1976 issue and I produced a newsletter every month until August 2023, making a total of 546 issues over 45 years and 7 months.

I continued as Editor for all those years because I believed a quality newsletter was near the center of a successful car club and because Corvairs of New Mexico was by far the best car club -- possibly the best organization -- I have ever ben a member of. I tried to make the publication of value to all our members with useful and interesting articles.

After some twenty years of editing a paper newsletter that was mailed out to our members and to a few CORSA chapters on an exchange basis, I was able to build a web page that could hold each month's newsletter as well as a calendar and various topics about the club that might be useful to our members. It eventually became possible to include a full-color PDF of the newsletter, and a few of our members preferred to view or download the PDF instead of getting the paper copy in the mail.

When I resigned Greg Nelson and Steve Gongora assumed command of the club's newsletter and the September issue was available on schedule at the end of August. I have included this issue on my web page. The club and the Board of Directors will have to decide on publishing future newsletters. They can certainly be available on the club's CORSA-sanctioned web site but it may be necessary to cease mailing paper copies. Stay tuned.

I am no longer editor but as a member of Corvairs of New Mexico my hope is that our members will continue to give the new editor the level of support I enjoyed over the last 45 years. It would be hard to count the many quality articles, news items and tech tips I received from our members for the newsletter. Please keep up the good work and think of how YOU can support our newsletter and our editor and officers as you keep those Corvairs running into the future.


