## TECH TIP--DO NOT LET THAT PILOT BUSHIN GROWL

Many of you with stick shifts probably have experienced a noisy pilot bushing through the years. When you just let the clutch out in reverse or first a chirp or moan will come from the rear. Later it gets worse and will groan anytime that the clutch is depressed and the car is in gear. Normally the noise gets to your nerves and you pull the engine to replace that \$2.00 part. I saw what can happen if you ignore the noise until breakage occurs on a customers car just at the first of the year.

There is a retainer ring along with the input shaft seal inside the T. O. bearing shaft and when the oilite pilot bushing wears completely out the input shaft can bounce around inside the hole in the crank and use that split retainer ring like a cutting tool. When the retainer ring has cut through the T. O. bearing shaft, the bearing has no support and falls off. Needless to say the clutch no longer works.

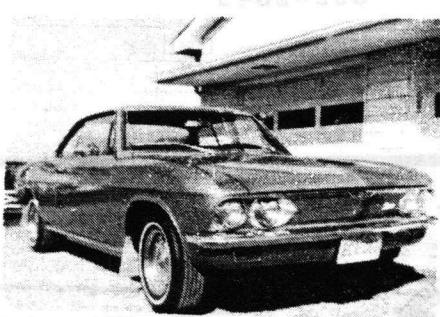
The subject of how to lube the pilot bushing before installation can be another page, everyone has their own ideas of what works and what does not, but the moral of this story is when your pilot bushing starts making noise, fix it.

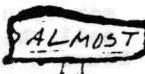
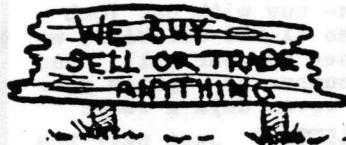

1963 CHEVROLET REPRINTS



1963

With the regular Corvair station wagon a thing of the past, buyers who wanted a large capacity vehicle with an air-cooled rear engine had to settle for the Greenbrier Sport Wagon, Model 1206. The wagon had a 95-inch wheelbase, was 179.7 inches long overall, weighed 2,990 pounds, and sold for \$2,655. Corvair produced 13,761.



1963

The Corvair 500 was a one-model series consisting only of this 2-Door Club Coupe, Model 0527. At \$1,992, it was the only Chevrolet vehicle to have a base price under \$2,000. It weighed 2,330 pounds and drew 16,700 sales.

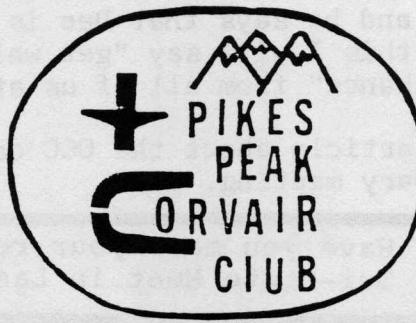

## OCC DUES INCREASE

At the January meeting it was announced that the club dues for the OCC has doubled, from \$25.00 to \$50.00. In addition to that fee, the lobbyist fees will remain the same, \$3.00 per person. There were some objections to the 100% increase. I called Barry Abels and talked at length about this. Part of the problem stems from the fact that when the OCC wanted to raise the dues by only \$5 or \$10 a few years ago, the reps all objected, now the OCC is caught by needing money for operating expenses that they do not have. This money is used for postage, newsletters, phones and that sort of thing. It is kept separate from swap meet and car show money.

The objections were leveled at the fact that 100% increases are hard to understand. I might add that actually spending the money from our club treasury is not really the issue, we are certainly able to afford it. Other objections were that the lobbyist is not needed particularly this year. The deadline for new bills has passed and nothing to affect the hobby is pressing this year. I asked Barry if the lobbyist could be put on a retainer instead of paying him but Barry said that would be difficult this year, the lobbyist would not co-operate in this.

Another thing that set the OCC back this year was a financial loss at the car show. Apparently hidden costs of Currigan Hall made expenses greater than the budget had allowed and even though the attendance was acceptable a combination of that and the fact that a lot of freebie tickets were issued forced the loss. (The freebie tickets were for vendors and car show entrants).

At the February meeting there will be a vote to either stay in the OCC or to drop out. The principle of the OCC is safety in numbers is valid. The legislators can develop a mind set against the older cars and with a stroke of a pen change our hobby, in that respect the lobbyist can be useful. The swap meet has certainly been the best in the area and ranks with the medium size swap meets around the country. Granted that the money that we make from the swap meet is pretty close to the dues/lobbyist fees.

PPCC would like to see anyone with a point of view on this to come to the February meeting. If you cannot attend and would like to state your opinion, phone me or drop a card to the PO box.

I personally would like to suggest that if the vote goes to stay in the OCC, that PPCC draft a letter to the OCC outlining our views of the car show, workers lists that do not take into account the distance of driving and possibly suggesting that the OCC be run more like a business. In my conversation with Barry, he said that he was disappointed that the workers lists were not adjusted to take into account the distance, car pooling, etc., and that he would try to help the out-of-town clubs in the future.

Another point that was brought up in the January meeting was that the OCC had been partially behind a bill concerning insurance. This bill would tax all Colorado drivers to provide insurance for those without insurance. Barry said that there were parts of the bill that the OCC still liked. I might add that a conversation with my insurance agent went entirely opposite, he stated that in the two states that already had that law that the tax was high and since it was run by the state, had the normal problems encountered with anything the government has a hand in.

Larry Neil is V. President and a special thank you to Marcia Shuck for all of her work in 1991. There were no other new officers.

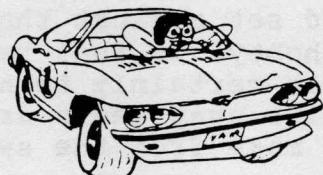
NEW BUSINESS:

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 pm. with door prizes to follow.

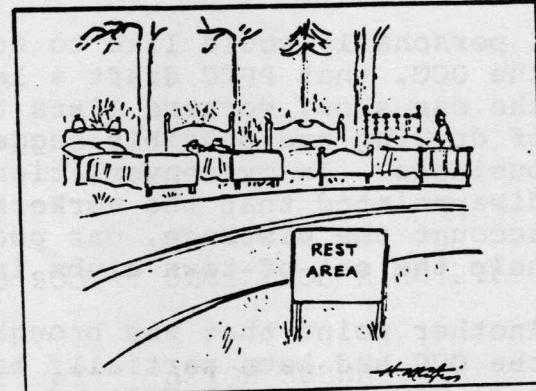

**Beware The Invasion Of The Counterfeit Parts!**

We have been warned often about not getting what we think we are getting when buying rebuilt or remanufactured items. Now it's gotten even worse. The U.S. Department of Commerce estimates that EIGHT BILLION DOLLARS worth of bogus auto parts are sold here yearly. The parts most often counterfeited, right down to the packaging, are spark plug wires, distributor caps, gas filters, brake pads, and brake shoes. This is so widespread that one of every two persons will have an experience with bogus parts within his/her lifetime. An estimated 50% of these parts are made right here at home; most of the rest come from the Asian area. Pittsburgh, PA has been identified as a "dumping ground" for large shipments of brake parts which do not meet safety requirements. Federal-Mogul, a large parts manufacturer, has followed the underground parts pipeline to sources in the Philippines, Korea, India, North Africa, and throughout the Western Pacific. Wheel covers are a favorite for counterfeiters. As soon as a source is [exposed], car makers sue them out of business, and they re-open the next day.

Champion Spark Plug Company has had serious problems with counterfeit parts. The counterfeiters collect old Champion plugs, clean them up, file the electrodes flat, repaint the metal, and sell them as new. This has given Champion a bad reputation, understandably. You will still hear people say that Champion plugs don't last long. Now you know why, so beware. Look for electrodes that seem a bit thin, or a center electrode that seems short. I have seen plugs packaged and labeled as "remanufactured", whatever that meant, and if you buy them, you get what you pay for or even less.

More than \$2 million worth of bogus brake rotors and drums were sold in the Pittsburgh area last year. When you buy a rotor or drum, and the price is 30-40% below other brands, be suspicious. There is probably 30-40% difference in quality too. Your sweetheart's life is too valuable to trust to inferior parts.

Some specific examples are:

\*Brake linings were found made of compressed wood chips and cardboard.

\*Oil filters were made to look like Fram filters, but when cut open were found to be made of perforated food cans stuffed with rags. The food cans still had Japanese writing on them with pictures of squid and other sea food.

\*Automatic transmission fluid made of cheap fuel oil and red dye was sold in Massachusetts for a fleet of school buses. This cheap fluid was labeled as Dexron II, and caused a great deal of transmission damage.

\*Antifreeze was sold that was so caustic it could eat right through an aluminum radiator in 48 hours.

\*CR Industries discovered copy-cat seals made to look like their "Scotseal" after complaints poured in about failures from as little as 14 hours use. The counterfeited seals were imported from Japan, Korea, and Taiwan.

\*The U.S. Department of Defense awarded a contract to a counterfeiter for replacement pistons for troop carriers and ambulances. The fake pistons self-destructed after the equivalent of 15,000 miles.

\*A Japanese auto parts company has been found guilty and will pay a fine, for making counterfeit Ford universal joints. (And possibly others?). The parts were sold by their subsidiary, GMB of Southern California and New Jersey.

\*Brake drum-to-wheel lug bolts. The repair market is flooded with substandard fasteners. Wheels have been lost and vehicles wrecked due to substandard lugs. Some stores offer 50% or greater discounts on them. Tons of bolts, not just lug bolts, are being hastily dumped on the U.S. market to beat the Quality Fastener Act (HR 3000)\* that will become law in November. Many of these bolts will be sold as high quality, high tensile strength, grade 8 bolts, and they really aren't, and you wouldn't know it without doing your own controlled destructive torque tests on samples.

Bob Serabin (one of four engineers at Bowman Distribution, Inc, in Cleveland), says the main reason for lug bolt failure is over-torqueing. Using a pneumatic air tool to fasten wheel lug nuts (as you have been warned, many tire shops do this routinely), coupled with no lubricant, causes the nut to dig into the wheel metal. This makes the coefficient of friction increase, and the torque value decrease. Bowman recommends using anti-seize compound on wheel lugs to prevent galling, and a torque wrench for proper installation. I (Lou Snutt) have been doing this for years, and have not yet lost a wheel.

\*Inspection of every lot of fasteners. If a single piece fails, the whole lot is rejected.

\*An 18 month warranty, the best in the industry. The warranty even covers labor costs to replace failed fasteners, in some cases.

\*Technical support services and seminars. (the public may attend these seminars; call the hotline number for time and place), application engineering, and failure analysis.

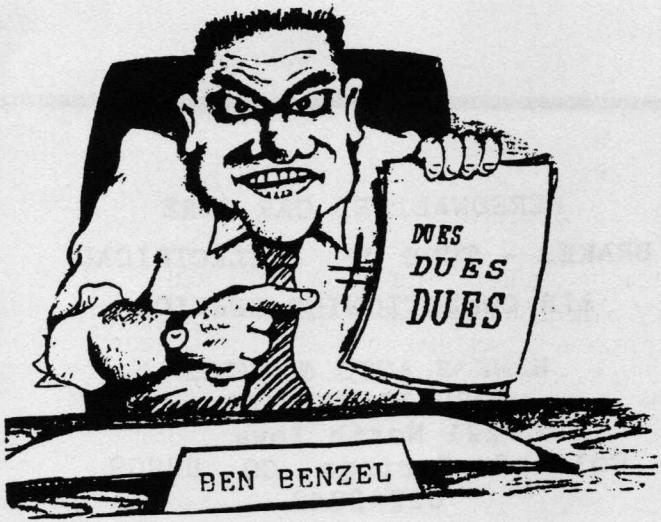
\*Supplier audits to insure that only quality fasteners are distributed under the Bowman name.

FIXING POWERGLIDE CABLE LEAKS - by - Francis Boydston

Thanks to some research by Wendell Walker, I have decided to market a repair kit to fix Corvair automatic transmission cable leaks.

I would imagine nearly everyone in our Club who has had an automatic Corvair has at one time or another experienced a leak in the shift cable near the rear of the cable, either because of shrinking or cracking of the cable covering or because the covering has had a hole worn in it.

Wendell discovered a type of shrink tubing in a size that is perfect to seal the leak. The tubing is large enough to slide over the front end of the cable and back to the site of the leak. Apply heat and the tubing shrinks down to fit tightly around the cable. There is sealing material inside the tubing that does an excellent job of sealing the leak.

I will also stock a slightly larger size shrink tubing which will slide over the cable mount which goes into the transmission. Using this size will save you the problem of removing the cable from the tunnel and the instrument panel; you can just remove the connector at the rear, slip on the larger tubing, replace the cable, then heat-shrink the tubing to seal around both connector and cable. If you already have the entire cable out, it's preferable to use the smaller tubing as the resulting repair is a little neater.

My price is going to be \$1.50 for a 2-inch piece and \$3.00 for a 6-inch piece, regardless of diameter. An instruction sheet will be furnished.

This job requires a source of heat. A propane torch, a good hot hairdryer, or even a cigarette lighter will work. I prefer the propane torch.

## EMERGENCY PROCEDURE FOR A STRIPPED SPARK PLUG HOLE

Ever put in a spark plug and have that sinking feeling as you tighten and it keeps right on turning? Here is a temporary fix. Place the threaded portion of the plug in a vice. Protect the plugs threads from the vice jaws with pieces of aluminum, copper ect. Now tighten the vice just enough to slightly egg shape the threaded portion of the plug. Try it in the stripped hole. If it is not snug, squeeze it just a little more. Tighten the plug in carefully and not too heavy on the torque. Be sure the seal washer is tight and doing its job. Now you will be able to drive your vehicle to where the plug hole can be repaired with a helicoil or what ever method you wish.

## TORQUING YOUR SPARK PLUGS

As a long time aircraft mechanic I fully realize the importance of properly tightened spark plugs. The proper torque not only insures that the plug will not vibrate out but insures that it will not overheat. The plug heat is dissipated through the threads into the surrounding metal. Proper torque also insures a tight pressure seal. I am sure that by now my reader is saying "Ho Hum, so what else is new". Here are thoughts that are new and I have never before seen them expressed in print. A man standing with torque wrench in hand, having just torqued a plug to the proper torque and torqued the threads right out of the head, will probably not be much impressed with proper torquing at the moment. All he knows is that he is in big trouble. What had started out to be a simple tune up has turned into a monster.

## TORQUING YOUR SPARK PLUGS

## TORQUING YOUR SPARK PLUGS continued.

Now comes MR. GOOD WRENCH, doing everything just right and he is stuck with the disaster.

Corvair plug torque in my manuals is called out at 15 to 20 foot lbs. If you are using a torque wrench, use the low end. Five foot pounds makes quite a difference to elderly aluminum threads.

On my Vairs I use a 6" 3/8" drive ratchet to tighten my plugs. I find that I have a good feel of what is going on with that length of tool. If it turns in too hard you can feel it, or if its cross threading, you can tell before you do too much damage. Also you can feel when the gasket seats.

If you use a 1/2" drive ratchet or breakover bar to tighten your plugs, be careful. With the longer leverage your feel is cut down and you're stronger than you think. As far as feel goes, the torque wrench has the least. After I have finished tightening my plugs, I may go over them with a torque wrench just to see where the torque actually is and perhaps even them up a bit.

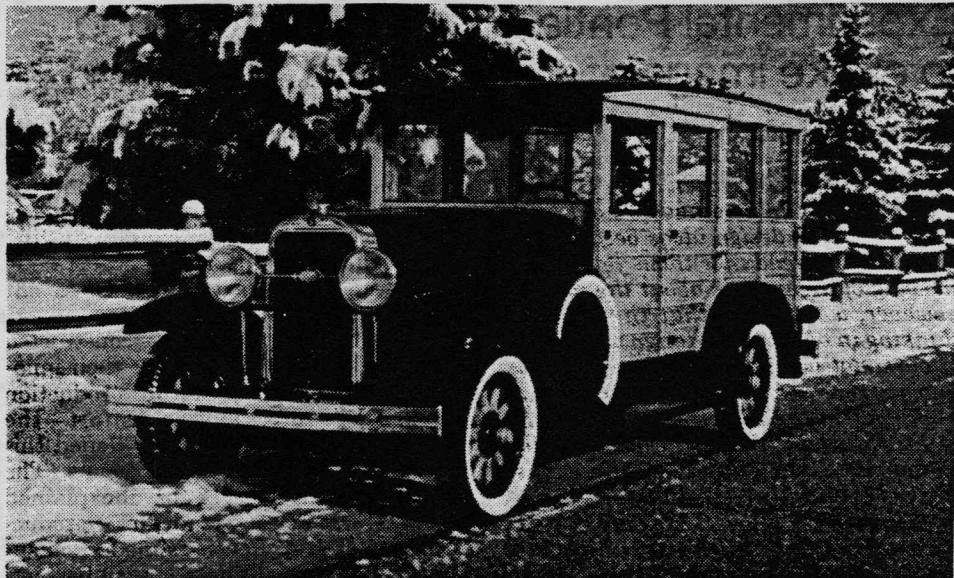
When using a torque wrench, hold everything straight and square. Allowing an extension to slant outward, increases torque drastically.

With a little thought and care those simple tune ups will stay simple.

COOLING FLAPPER DOORS. ARE THE BUSHINGS BROKEN OR MISSING?

What was this man doing wrong? The answer is "nothing". The only thing is that the specs. were written for heads that were cast at least ten years ago and as far back as nineteen. The plugs are threaded into soft aluminum, not cast iron as on other cars or into a special insert as used on aircraft. The plugs have been changed many times over the years. They have been cross threaded, over torqued, the heads overheated, short reach plugs used, threads not cleaned with a thread chaser, put in loose. You name it.

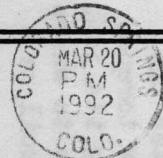
I understand that these can still be purchased from some sources. However, when I need one it is usually right now. I just flare a piece of copper tubing and then cut the flare off, leaving about 1/4" of tube with the flare. Flatten the flared area a little further with a hammer. Smooth up with a file or emery paper and you're ready to finish assembling your cooling doors.

## TOUR TEJON

This year the Tour Tejon is scheduled for the 16 and 17 of May. Sunday May 17 will be the car show. This is for a worthy benefit and I hope that we will have a bunch of Corvairs on the street.

## TRI-STATE

This year the annual Tri-State meet will be held in Los Vegas, NM on the last weekend of May. There will be sightseeing, tours and a show and shine plus a dinner Saturday night. Next year will be RMC (Denvers ) turn and the word is they are picking Alamosa. The following year will be our turn again. Try to get away on Friday May 29 and drive down. ## PULLED STUDS

If you work on enough Corvair or VW engines you will find a soft stud while torquing the heads. Usually it is not your fault, the person before you either did not work up the torque range (10-15-20, etc) or pulled too hard. Sometimes though it is not anyones fault except old age. According to a metallurgist aluminum can lose the tensil strength if it is subjected to enough heat or enough stretching.

Air cooled engines expand and contract a bunch more than water cooled engines. Combine that with a difference in expansion/contraction between the aluminum and the cast iron cylinders and the head studs are pulled on severely each time the engine is brought up to normal temps and then shut off. Notice I said normal, when a car climbs a hill, the temp is above normal and then the coast down the other side quickly cools the engine again. Ask anyone who has a turbo car, I have seen 500 degrees climbing Parvin Pass or even Rabbit Ears, reach the top and be at less than 300 degrees in 5 minutes.

Keeping your engine clean is probably the only recourse, old age is kind of like fate, it will just happen. The worst leak that I can think of to promote non-cooling around the case and through the fins on the cylinders and heads is the top cover (under the fan). The only way is to remove the fan shroud and retorque the top cover and replace the o-ring on the vent tube. You should also clean the cylinder fins and the fin openings in the heads. This is a time consuming operation, remove the bottom sheet metal and put a light under the head and then with hacksaw blades, long drill bits, anything to stick into the fins, clean until light comes through the openings.

Like I said, it will not help with old age, it will give the engine a better chance to breath. Incidentally, in my reference to the stretching/shrinking of the engine, that is the reason there are hydraulic lifters in the Corvair. VW has solids and must be adjusted constantly. Any VW that I build, I install hydraulics in them too, makes for a much quieter engine.

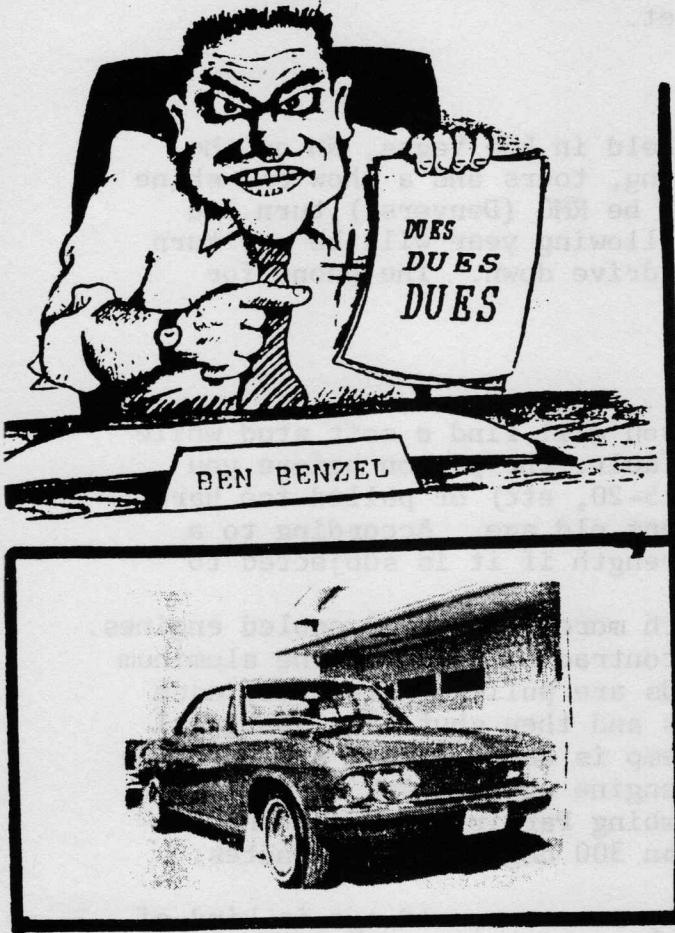

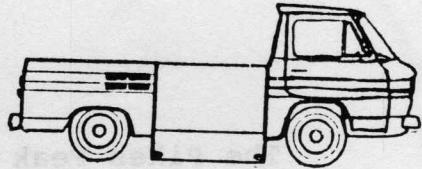
**I.C.C.C. REPORT:**

By way of background, John Koll called his friend Joe back in Minnesota many months ago. He got his wife Sally on the phone and asked for Joe. She said he was in the hospital. John asked what happened. She made some remark about his intelligence and said she would tell him to write to John sometime. His letter is attached.

Dear John,

I apologize for being so long in writing to you, but I have been unable to write due to my injuries. Today my nurse put me next to a typewriter and I am able to type using one finger.

I'll explain my injuries although it is all rather embarrassing.

About ten months ago I heard they were going to tear down this five-story building over in Pleasantville. There had always been rumors that the building had at one time been a warehouse for automobile parts back in the 30s. I drove over and asked if I could look through the building before it was demolished. The contractor said yes, but that I would have to hurry.

I finally realized that my problem was from hanging on to the rope so I let go. When the barrel came down it landed on me and broke several ribs.

Doctor says I should get out of the hospital in 2 or 3 months.

Do you know where I could find a cheap car with an automatic transmission? In the divorce Sally got the house and all the cars except the Cameo I drove over here. It got towed in as an abandoned vehicle and sold at the police auction. Sally and Jim (she married that guy she had been seeing) traded the Vette, the CORSA convertible and the Model A roadster in on a Honda. I heard they got a \$1,000 each on the trade in.

#### JOINING NATIONAL CORSA

Back in the late 1970s the insurance carrier for National (Corsa) was KKK. They were famous for sponsoring NASCAR stock cars. KKK demanded that each member of a local club be a member of National also. Their reasoning was that the insurance coverage they provided covers us at local meetings, such things as the cook out and even sitting in the meeting room, therefore each member had to join.

When another insurance company took over, they did not have that stipulation. At that same time the chapter plan took effect. The plan did not care about having 100% national members either. They do print yearly in the COMMUNIQUE a list of all the clubs and the percentage that belong to national. The benefits for belonging to national are slim unless you go to the conventions. #### HEAD GASKETS PART 2

Last month we were talking about causes for head gaskets burning. There is a problem sometimes when a head gasket has burned, it is damn hard to get the head off without removing the cylinder too. The carbon build up is so bad that the cylinder sticks tight inside the head.

This requires a great deal of patience, tap the head outward, knock the cylinder in; tap and knock--rock the head up and down, keep the head straight as it comes off the engine. It can be done but it requires some time. When the cylinder comes off the piston, the rings are disturbed which makes it very iffy having a seal again plus compressing the rings is difficult too, even with a split compressor tool. It gets harder too with a 164 engine because the bottom of the cylinder is relieved to clear the crankshaft. When the end of a ring gets into that opening, it will not always stay compressed.

Like I said--PATIENCE and PERSISTENCE

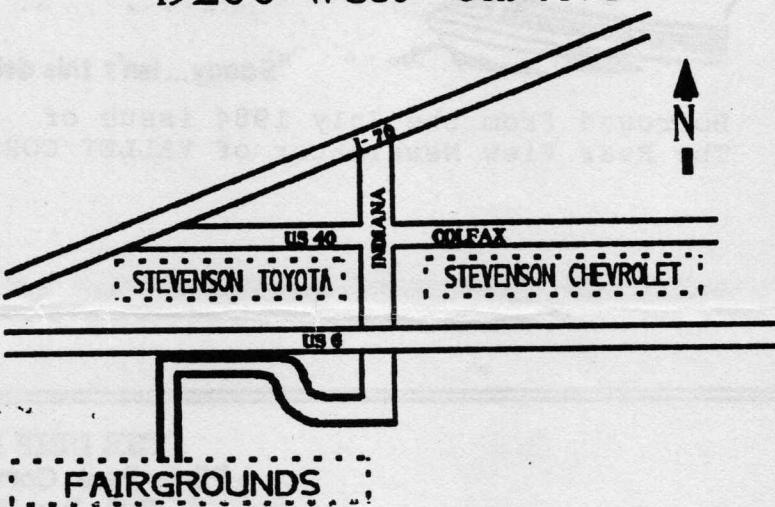

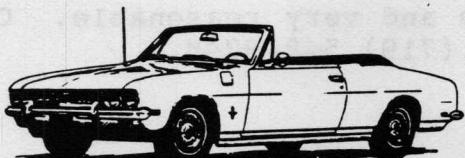
**NEW BUSINESS:**

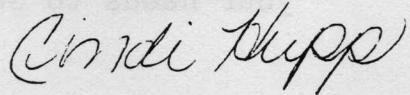
**I.C.C.C. REPORT:**

## Senate Bill 2237 Says "All Old Cars Must Die"

If you're thinking of doing a restoration on a vintage car or truck, or, if like many Americans, you drive a vehicle that was made before 1980, Senate Bill 2237 should get your attention. Senator William Roth of Delaware has introduced S.2237, unofficially known as "the clunker bill", which seeks to eliminate ALL cars manufactured before 1980. According to an article by David Boles in *Custom Power News*, the reasoning behind S.2237 is that cars of yesterday need to meet the stringent emission requirements of today. Boles goes on to say that, "Senator Roth and his band of unmerry men would like to see all of the major auto manufacturers participate in 'giving' you and me the whopping sum of \$2,000 for our pre-1980 car. Actually, it's worded as a \$2,000 credit, so I guess we can all see where this is headed. Trade in the old car for a brand new one and receive a \$2,000 credit towards the new car's purchase.

"As of this writing, the big three auto manufacturers are behind this bill. Big surprise there, since the average age of registered vehicles in America has risen from 2.5 years to 7.5 years since 1980. That is money right out of the big auto manufacturers' mouths. With new car sales in a shambles, a Federal program to take old cars off the road would do nothing but fatten the auto manufacturers' latley reduced larder. It would increase the sales of new cars; substantially, if not totally, reduce the used car market; and it would look good politically. They are doing it to save the environment.

"There will be exceptions for museums, or show-only cars, but for the average Joe Citizen out there in the wilds of America, his '74 El Camino will become but yet another flower pot in the yard. The practical point would be that all the classic cars would be owned by those people who are wealthy enough to retrofit them with the new emission standards. We'd be straining our necks every time we thought we had a glimpse of one while we were driving to our favorite burger joint in our brand new Hyundai!

"It's going to take a public outcry to nip this idiocy in the bud. I don't know about you, but I'd sure be upset if I had to watch my car be crushed because of an idiotic bill like S.2237, and then two years later find out that the emission standards test had been off for years and a terrible mistake had been made."

If you don't like the sound of this, write U.S. Senators Hank Brown and Tim Wirth and let them know how you feel.

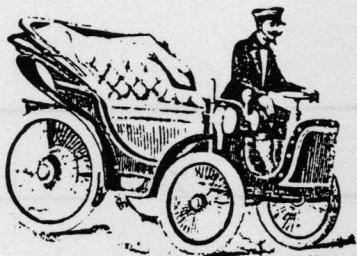

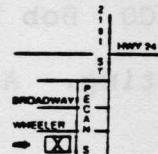

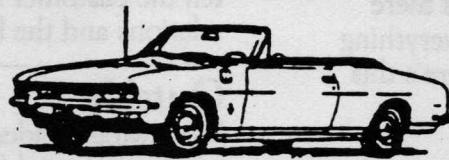

## Cleaning Window Film

### Inside

You may have heard this one before . . . "Is there something wrong with my car? I've tried everything to clean the inside of my windows, but there's this film that just won't come off!"

Customers with this complaint deserve something more than "Don't worry, it's normal." Car interiors create the ideal atmosphere for buildup on the inside of windows. Cigarette smoke, condensation, dust, and so on, can blend in a closed hot car interior to form a "cloud" that eventually coats the windows. The hotter the weather, the quicker the film builds up.

We've found that a solution of one part white vinegar to ten parts water is the best for cleaning the film off the inside of car windows. (It's also one of the window cleaners recommended in the owner's manual.)

Even though you're not in the business of washing people's windows, you might keep a bottle of vinegar solution around. If a really bad case of film comes in for service, clean the inside of the windshield. Leave a note explaining how you "solved" the problem (or tell the customer directly). It's good customer relations and the kind of thing people remember.

### Outside

Most wiper blades "smear" or "chatter" because of a build-up of road film on the glass and blades. Before replacing the blades, try this:

Clean the windshield with a mild abrasive cleanser, such as "Soft Scrub" or "Bon Ami Cleaning Powder." Continue to clean the glass until rinse water no longer "beads up," but rather "sheets" off the glass. Clean the blades using a cloth or towel saturated with a 50/50 solution of water and isopropyl alcohol (rubbing alcohol), then rinse the blades well with water.

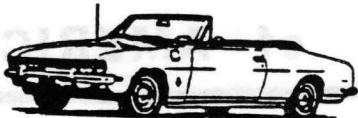
### NOTES FROM THE PREZ

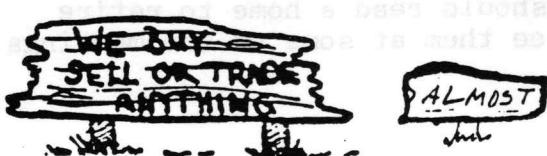
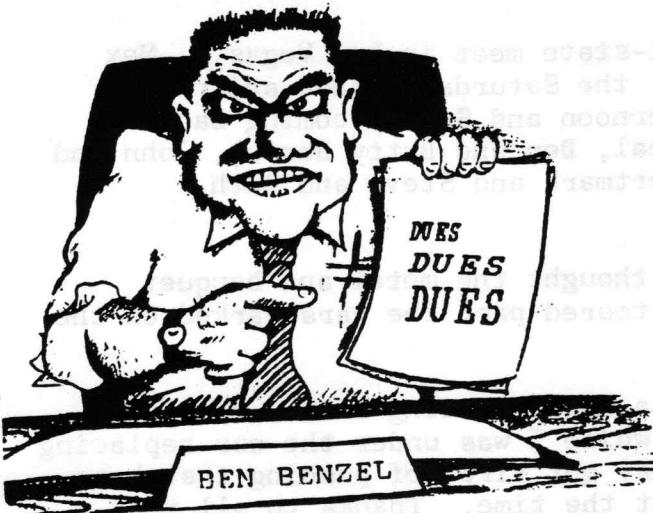
## YOUNG MEMBERS

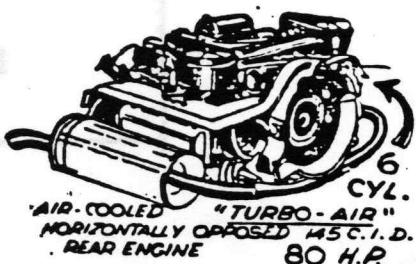

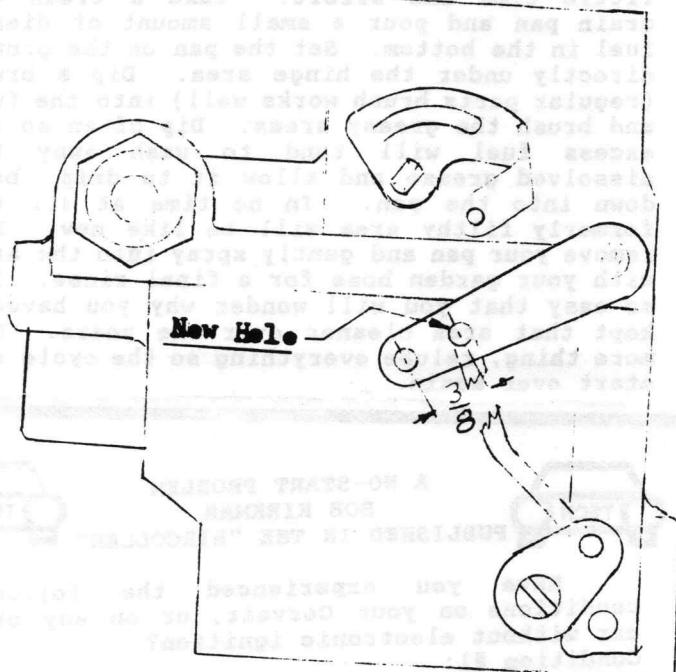
# THE TECHNICAL SIDE

## ACCELERATION PUMP TIP NO. 06-01-87

The standard Corvair accelerator pump can be modified to give a little quicker action as follows:

On the pump lever, drill another hole as shown approximately  $3\frac{1}{8}$ " toward it's fulcrum, and move the accelerator pump rod to the new hole. You have two choices in retaining it. You can reverse the rod and put the hairpin at the top and the clip at the bottom. The other way is to file a new groove on the plain end of the rod and use a hairpin type retainer on both ends. The left carb can be modified without removing from the engine if you prefer.

## LUG NUTS

## PLASTIC FIX TIP NO. 06-02-87

Some hard plastic parts on your Corvair can be repaired or modified using the type cement used for plastic water pipe. Oatey brand cement is locally available, as are other brands, and is excellent for armrests, heater and defroster duct repair. It is clear in color and is a solvent type adhesive which causes the plastic to flow and join together.

Recently the armrest of my 69 coupe pulled apart where the screw passes through it into the door. By overlapping some small pieces of water pipe across the broken place I believe I have achieved a successful repair.

## CARBURETOR SPRING CLIP TIP NO. 06-03-87

The formed wire spring clips that hold the air cleaner cover on the 61-63s, 61-65 vans and the 64-65s with Air Conditioning can be made compatible with your new repaint job by slipping a piece of rubber hose such as that used on the distributor vacuum line over the clip. Use a piece 3 1/4 inches long, work it over the wire so that it lies across the cover where the wire would contact the cover. Now no paint is scraped off when snapping the clip on or off.

### STEERING GEAR ADJUSTMENT

Les Huckins



Here's an adjustment that takes about ten minutes - on the car - without taking anything loose - unlike the shop manual that goes on and on, leading you down the garden path (why do they do that? paid by the word?).

If you have excessive play in your steering wheel, and it's the gear box for a change (usually it's the pitman arm bushing), here's what you can do:

With the wheels in the straight ahead position, rock the steering wheel back and forth, noting how much effort it takes to rock it. Now loosen the large lock nut around the "Worm Bearing Adjuster" nut with a hammer and screwdriver, and tighten the adjuster nut; just "snug". Then rock the wheel and "back up" the adjuster so that there is little or no change in effort necessary to rock the wheel. Next, loosen the lock nut on the "Lash Adjuster" with a 9/16" end wrench, and hold it while you turn in the adjustment with a screwdriver. It will turn easily, so when you reach the "snug" position, rock the wheel again, and see that all of the play has disappeared.

If the wheel is now hard to turn, back off the adjustment slightly, reaching the best compromise of ease-of-turning and lack-of-free-play. Tighten the lock nuts and check for steering gear fluid. Remove the filler plug and poke your little finger in there to check the level. If not up to the top, fill it up, and since it's a secret in the shop manual, I used 140 weight gear oil.



### REAR END CLEANLINESS

I have been asked so many times how I keep my transmission and rear end (in the car) looking new. I usually just shrug and act innocent. Well there is a way, several companies are making a spray paint that is the color of cast iron. Just clean your transmission and etc until all grease is gone. next wire brush with your drill and a rotary wire wheel, spray with Cast Coat. It looks like brand new. VHT brand makes a cast coat in 1400 degree paint so you can do you exhaust manifolds also. This looks great on anything that is natural cast like front and rear brake drums, master cylinders and etc. If you are making a factory stock concourse car, don't put it on your exhaust pipes, that is another tech tip.

DOOR HINGE AREAS--SO DIRTY--SO HARD TO CLEAN

Most of the real dirt is caused by lubricating the hinges and the door hold open mechanism. If you don't lube them they will squeak and sound terrible and worse yet, the door hold open mechanism will wear out and break. They eventually will break anyway on some models, but they will last a lot longer if they are lubed. The only way to go is to clean them when they get to looking bad and then relube them. How many of us have looked into this area and said, "this reminds me of the smile of a beautiful girl with bad teeth". Here is a ten minute way to improve the smile of your little concours queen, with very little time and effort. Take a clean oil drain pan and pour a small amount of diesel fuel in the bottom. Set the pan on the ground directly under the hinge area. Dip a brush (regular parts brush works well) into the fuel and brush the greasy areas. Dip often so the excess fuel will tend to wash away the dissolved grease and allow it to drip back down into the pan. In no time at all the formerly filthy area will be like new. Now remove your pan and gently spray into the area with your garden hose for a final rinse. Its so easy that you will wonder why you haven't kept that area cleaner over the years. One more thing, relube everything so the cycle can start over again.



### A NO-START PROBLEM

Have you experienced the following conditions on your Corvair, or on any other car without electronic ignition?

Condition #1:

Engine will crank and crank, and never "fire". But when you release the ignition key, the engine is running!

Condition #2:

Engine will crank OK, but will never fire. If you add a booster battery it will fire and start OK. After the engine is warm, it will start OK, but the next cold morning it again will not "fire".

The cause for both conditions can be the same. Something has happened to the circuit from the starter solenoid that applies "full 12 volts" to the coil for starting. You then are trying to start on a reduced voltage normally applied to the coil when the engine is running. Heavy battery draw during cold weather cranking can drop this reduced voltage a bit more and it seems that the coil doesn't produce the right spark to fire the engine. Check for a loose connection, or a broken wire at, or from the solenoid. Of course, something could have happened to the brass finger contact inside the solenoid.

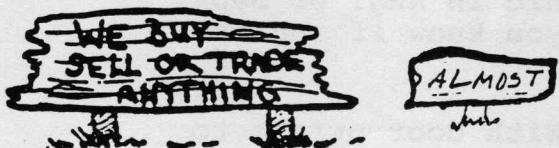
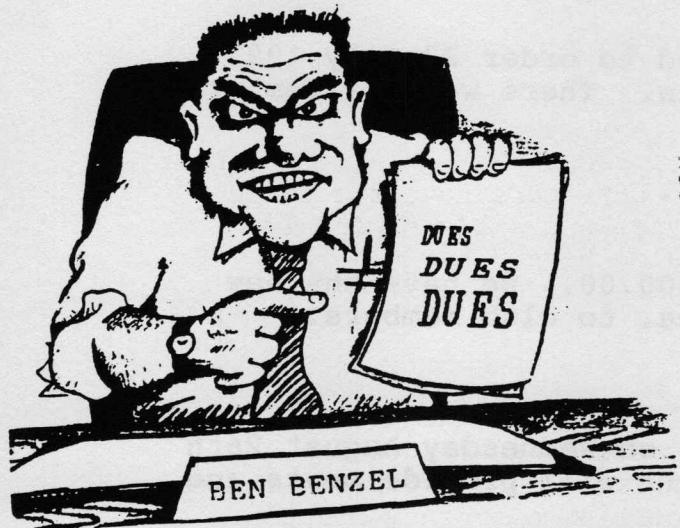

WATCH THOSE GROUNDS

I may have talked about this before but it bears repeating. Grounds from the battery are connected to both the frame and to the engine. The early cars have the ground cable to the side of the frame and then over to the generator bracket. Some also have small braid straps from the engine sheet metal to the sides of the engine compartment. Late cars have the large cable going to the engine by the alternator brace and a 10 ga wire from the battery post down the frame. Most lates also have 3 braid straps from the engine sheet metal to the sides of the engine compartment. FC is like early models. When only one ground is connected, either to the engine or the frame but not to the other several bad things can happen. Either the starter will drag, barely turning the engine over leaving you to believe that the battery is down or the engine will not turn over at all. Equally bad is the ground will search for a connecting point, in most cases the emergency brake cable and sometimes the clutch cable and in rare instances the PG shift cable. When this happens the clutch or emergency brake cable will be severely weakened or burn right though. The PG shift cable will be stiff to operate or seized in place. In any case a sizable repair bill when it could have been remedied by checking the ground connections.

OCTANE RATINGS

Walt handed me a couple of articles about fuel octane ratings and asked for my comments in the DRIPLINE. First of all since I am not an engineer, I think I can get in real trouble trying to explain octane rating methods. The gist of the one article was the fact that many people are using too high an octane gas than their car needs. That is true especially in the newer cars that are computer controlled. I think that all of us know that the higher the compression in the engine the need for higher octane gas. The Corvair was originally designed (in 60) to use plain old regular, using a comp ratio of 8:1. With the 102hp engine plus the later turbo, 140 and even the 110 the suggestion was to use premium. In the early years that amounted to 97 octane usually. The 95hp in the late cars was designed for regular on purpose. It was not used in Corsa models and was a lesser hp engine.

With the highest octane rating to being 91 or 92 this would seem to be the choice of all but the lower hp engines but this is not necessarily so. Speaking from my experiences the middle gas of 87 seems to suit my turbos and 140s just fine and the 92 does not seem to make that much difference. I do have cars coming into the shop that run better with the 92 octane. I do not know whether my combustion chambers are cleaner than those cars or whether my cars are a little richer in jetting. I do know that the lack of lead does not leave the carbon deposits on the pistons and around the valves and on the turbo wheel. This may help a clean engine run on the lesser gas. Also some of the cars that are more tending to ping are driven only around town and never see distance driving at highway speeds, leading my to believe that the carbon build up on their engines is greater than mine.

The real bottom line is to experiment with the gas and it takes more than a couple of tanks to check the performance of each car. Like I say, this is more from my experience and experimenting than with technical knowledge.

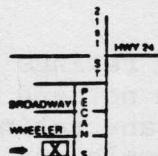

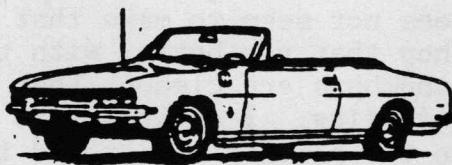

# BEWARE: THE LEGISLATURES ARE IN SESSION!



**F**our friends who live in four different counties here in the Atlanta Metropolitan area own gullwing Mercedes. Recently, one of them received his tag (license plate) renewal forms in the mail from the State of Georgia. The bill? \$3289.60! The funny thing is that one of the others, who lives only six or seven miles away (but in a different county) got a bill for \$12.99 for the plates on his prize-winning gullwing, a much better car than the unrestored model with the big tax bill.

The truth is that collector cars are a high profile item in these days of tax-starved local and state governments. If you collect stamps, coins, art, or hoard diamonds, gold, or silver, the revenuers never find out about you. Or if you squander your money on wine, women and song you are exempt from taxes designed to punish the thrifty and reward the profligate.

Car collectors preserve a portion of the history of the country, making these mechanical artifacts available (during parades, tours and trips to the gas station, not even mentioning the car shows) to the general public without the cost in tax dollars that a state museum of transportation would soak up. Most of these cars have paid their dues over the years in license plate charges covering anywhere from 25 to 100 years of fees. Many collectors use their cars so little that the cost of buying license plates amounts to more than a dollar for every mile of driving.

My father used to say that no man's life, liberty or property was safe while the legislature is in session. In these fiscally desperate times, this is especially true. After all, if you collect cars you must be rich, right? And if you're rich, let's tax the hell out of you!

The whole concept of license plate fees was based upon the idea that those who use the roads should pay for their building and maintenance. Not bad thinking up to a point. A gasoline tax, however, is more equitable because those that use the roads the most will pay the most. License plates help even out the inequities created by the use of heavy trucks which are much harder on the highways than passenger cars and which also result in a far higher-per-mile construction cost.

(We wouldn't need those 12-inch plus thick pavements if they were being used solely by Camaros and Escorts.)

There are 159 counties here in Georgia and each county sets its own mill rate for the tag tax. The problem began when one of the local officials "discovered" an old car value guide. Applying it indiscriminately and regardless of the condition of the cars (which no one from the tax office ever inspected), they sent out bills reflecting the values in top condition found in the book. It was a veritable gold mine for the county and many hapless car owners who had paid \$15 the previous year received a bill for \$300 or more. This virus is spreading in the state and one county after another is now joining the gold rush.

To offset this plague, a new group has been formed to get legislative relief for the inequities that have been generated. It is called the Georgia Association of Motor Clubs (California has had a similar organization for years) and its goals are to serve as a legislative watchdog guarding against new legislation detrimental to the automobile

hobby, and it lobbies against unfair vehicle registration fee and tax policies, discriminatory equipment legislation and even initiates legislation favorable to the restoration and preservation of these historical vehicles. A lobbyist has been hired to be on hand at the capitol. Most of the major car clubs have joined the organization. They pay dues to cover the expenses, and regular meetings are held to discuss legislation and to initiate contact with state senators and representatives by individual car owners.

Steve Rinaldo\* is the group chairman and can handle membership inquiries and furnish additional information to interested collectors. The price of tax equity is eternal vigilance, to paraphrase the old quotation. Readers in states without an umbrella organization would be well advised to initiate action to this end through their own local car club. Or, to put it in fractured Latin: *Nole permitere illegitimi carborundum!*

## **Maintenance-Free Battery Charging Voltage**

If you are using a new maintenance-free calcium grid battery, there is a chance you are running around with it partially charged. Your voltage regulator was originally set for a battery with 2.0 volts per cell. Calcium grid batteries have 2.1 volts per cell, which means you should raise your regulator setting by 0.6 volts to reach a full charge. The setting should be between 14.0 and 14.4 volts.

Under the cover of your voltage regulator you will find two relays. (If you have a solid state regulator, you are out of luck here.) Increased spring force on one will raise the voltage. You can tell which

one by aiding the spring force with your finger -- the voltage will go up as you press. The spring is adjustable with a screw on some models and by bending a tang on others. Use a digital voltmeter to measure the voltage.

(This is NOT one of those cases where if a little is good, a lot is better. Adjust the voltage to the range of 14.0 to 14.4 only. Higher voltages will boil the battery dry, damaging the battery.)

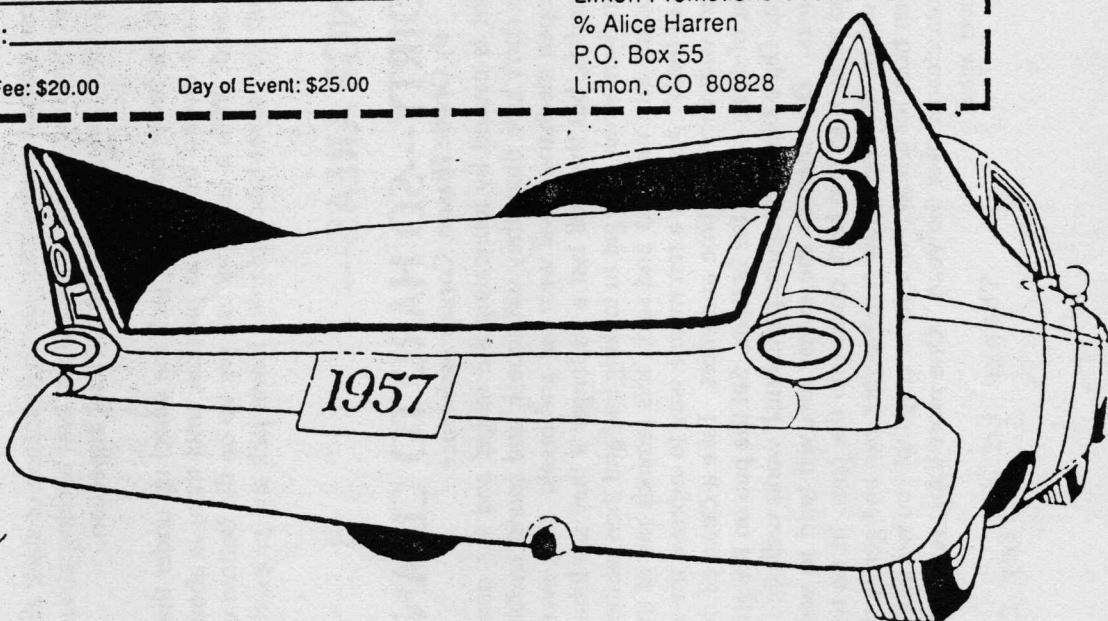

## A QUICK CHECK ON CORVAIR BALL JOINTS

Howard King - Corvair Houston

Since bad ball joints can cause lots of problems, here's a quick, easy way to check them.

First - With the vehicle on a flat, smooth surface, inspect the upper ball joints. Grasp the top of a front tire with both hands, push and pull, in and out, with a movement across the car. Any play is unacceptable. Go to the opposite side and check it the same way.

**NOTE:** Loose wheel bearings can give an indication of slack also. To check this, look for movement between the drum and backing plate. Repair any bearing play before going on with the ball joint inspection.

Second - To check the lower ball joints, jack the wheel up under the control arm with the jack as far out toward the tire as possible, until there is about a two inch clearance to the ground. With a large pry bar, pry up on the bottom of the tire. A  $1/16$ " or less play, up and down is acceptable. Lower jack and proceed to the other side.

## DOOR HINGE AREAS...

### SO DIRTY...SO HARD TO CLEAN!

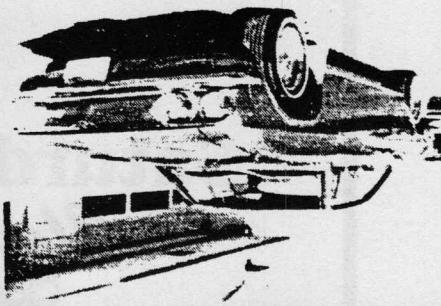

Most of the real dirt is caused by lubricating the hinges and the door hold open mechanism. If you don't lube them they will squeak and sound terrible and worse yet, the door hold-open mechanism will wear out and break. They eventually break anyway on some models, but they will last a lot longer if they are lubed. The only way to go is to clean them when they get to looking bad and then relube them. How many of us have looked into this area and said, "this reminds me of the smile of a beautiful girl with bad teeth". Here is a ten minute way to improve the smile of your little concours queen, with very little time and effort. Take a clean oil drain pan and pour a small amount of diesel fuel in the bottom. Set the pan on the ground directly under the hinge area. Dip a brush (a regular parts brush works well) into the fuel and brush the greasy areas. Dip often so the excess fuel will tend to wash away the dissolved grease and allow it to drip back down into the pan. In no time at all the formerly filthy area will be like new. Now remove your pan and gently spray into the area with your garden hose for a final rinse. It's so easy that you will wonder why you haven't kept that area cleaner over the years. One more thing, relube everything so the cycle can start over again.

## MORE ON GAS AND OCTANE

In last month's DRIPLINE I talked about the quality of fuel for your car. basically what I said was to experiment with the lesser octanes, a lot of the time they will work in your car, saving you money. The common terms of poor gas is to say that the car pings. Actually it is probably predetonation, caused by the timing being too far advanced for the octane of the fuel. It seems to be most common in automatic trans cars. When you hear the tell-tale rattling you know that either the timing is advanced or the gas is poor.

BUT--there is more to it than that. Carbon build up in the heads and on the pistons can get hot enough on the edges that that heat will also fire the air/fuel mixture under compression. The obvious solution is to drive your car on the highway more and get rid of the carbon. The no-lead gas actually helps in these cases because the carbon buildup does not occur as much with the lack of lead.

The other problem may be too lean of main jet in the carbs. Lean mixtures promote heat, heat will amplify the ease of pinging; the more you ping (that builds heat also) the easier the ping is to occur. The solution is to richen the main jet. Usually a .002 larger jet will help considerably, plus the timing does not have to be retarded thus your engine has a little more snap. Fuel milage is not affected due to the fact that the engine will run better with the timing in the proper place than retarded.

Part of the reason that powerglide cars ping easier is because the engine always has a load on it plus the shift point to drive drops the engine rpm lower than shifting through the gears on a four speed. Also at idle at a traffic light, a stick shift is idling in neutral and the engine is running free. It is very important to have all sheet metal in place and the summer/winter plate in place and doubly so for an automatic. Any extra heat in the engine will only aggravate the problem. Another trick is to remove the bottom sheet metal where the thermostat is in the summer. This will really lower the head temps (50 degrees or more in my turbo cars). This way the heads are a little cooler.

It still boils down to experimenting with your car, but it is fun to do some experimenting once in a while. Now that the weather is already cooling down, summer heat is not really a problem until next.

### Why Recycling Oil Helps The Environment And Saves Energy...



- Used oil from a single oil change can ruin a million gallons of fresh water - a year's supply for 50 people. Used oil is insoluble, persistent, and can contain toxic chemicals and heavy metals. It's slow to degrade. It sticks to everything from beach sand to bird feathers. Used oil is a major source of oil pollution in our nation's waterways.
- "Do-it-yourselfers" - consumers who change their own oil - generate at least 200 million gallons of used oil every year. Americans who change their own oil throw away 120 million gallons of recoverable motor oil by dumping it on the ground, by pouring it down storm drains, or by putting it in trash cans.
- Recycling this oil would save the United States 1.3 million barrels of oil per day. One gallon of used oil provides the same 2.5 quarts of lubricating oil as 42 gallons of crude oil.
- The more waste we generate, the more we have to treat, store, and dispose of. So recycling makes more sense today than ever.
- Improper waste management costs money - your money! You pay in higher consumer prices, taxes for environmental cleanups, and increased health care costs when wastes are improperly managed.
- Recycling saves money and protects the environment. So help be part of the solution, not part of the problem. Recycle used oil and other automotive products, such as batteries.
- The auto industry has been a leader in recycling with its long history of reusing parts and scrapping old cars into new steel products. Many of the fluids and parts of an automobile can be recycled as described below.

#### Oil

Motor oil picks up lead and other toxic heavy metals in your car engine. It can be filtered and reused or diluted and used as industrial fuel by an oil processing facility. Oil never loses its ability to lubricate. It just needs to be reprocessed in order to be used again. You'll save valuable resources by recycling your oil. It takes 67 gallons of crude oil to make one gallon of motor oil but it takes less than two gallons of used motor oil to make that same gallon. Take your dirty oil in a clean plastic container to one of the locations listed in this directory.

#### Antifreeze

The United States uses more than 250 million gallons of antifreeze every year. When used in your car, antifreeze picks up lead and copper from your car radiator. Antifreeze is poisonous to humans and animals. Reuse your old antifreeze by filtering it and putting it back into your vehicle radiator. Call your mechanic to see if they have an antifreeze recycling machine.

#### Tires

In the United States, 278 million tires are disposed of every year - 45 million of these are used as retreads for new tires, 44 million are incinerated for energy and the rest are placed in landfills or tire dumps. Most of Colorado Springs' tires are being buried, in hopes that in the future it will be economically feasible to recycle them. Many trash haulers charge for tire pickup because of the problems tires cause in a landfill. Sears Southgate Auto Center is accepting some tires from the public because of their large retread line of tires.

#### Brake Fluid

Brake fluid should be changed by your mechanic. If you have collected some, do not dispose of it. Save the fluid in a tightly sealed container and bring it to one of the El Paso County Household Hazardous Waste Collection Programs.

#### Freon

All cars with air conditioning currently have freon-based coolants. If the coolant leaks it can damage the atmosphere. All mechanics dealing with this material must have a machine for recycling freon.

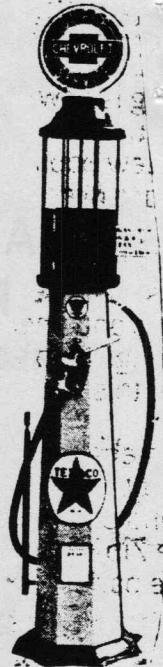

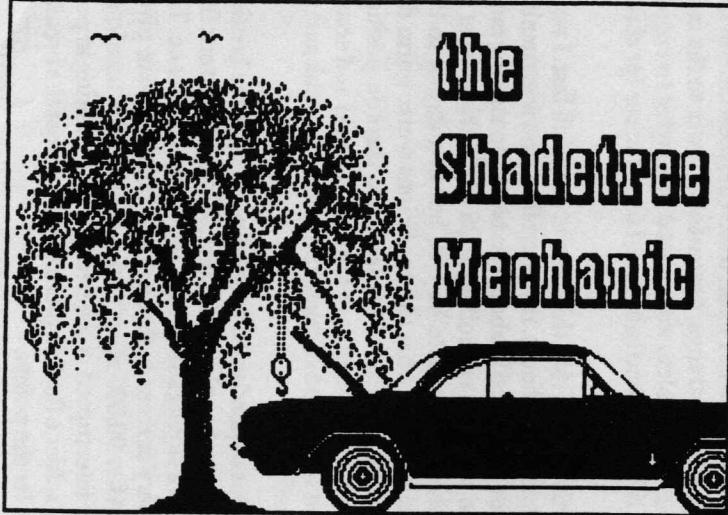

Well, the rainy (?) season should be about over now, so its time to see if any damage has been done that can be fixed easier now than later.

1. Trunk. Open the trunk and remove all those tools, rags, sacks of cement, and other necessary stuff. Check the floor under the mat for water and rust. Treat as required. I recommend wirebrushing with an electric drill or air tool, followed by an application of "Extend" (a rust treatment chemical available at NAPA, Jarco, etc), allowed to dry at least 24 hours, and then covering with a treatment of fiberglass resin, and painting to your choice. Check the bumper mounting bolts for signs of water leakage. They were originally installed with a type of soft putty to (hopefully) keep water out, but that may have been removed when Marsh took the good bumper off and put that one on before he sold you the car. You can treat them with RTV or your favorite type of stuff, all at once, if you also want to clean and repaint the inside of the bumper, or one at a time. While everything is out of the trunk is a good time to repaint or touch up. Spatter paint is available in spray cans or in quarts at NAPA and other places. You'll need at least two spray cans to re-do the entire trunk.

2. Brake master cylinder. Remove the top and check fluid level. Fill as necessary. Check for signs of fluid leakage around the brake line fittings. If the master cylinder is rusty, you might consider treating it with "Extend", also. Check the mounting bolts for tightness, excessive rust, etc. You can replace one at a time without disturbing the system integrity.

3. Windshield wiper motor. Check the electrical connections for looseness, frayed or about-to-break wires. Repair as necessary. Check mounting bolts for tightness. Well, that's it for this time. Next month it will be good enough weather to get out and get underneath.

## FROM THE GUYS WITH THE GREASY HANDS

### EMERGENCY REPAIR FOR AIR DUCTS

There are times when we check our Corvair air ducts and, to our dismay, they are split and leaking air, causing our engine to overheat. A "quick fix" to get us on our way is to cap off the offending duct until we can find a new hose. Most of us have a handy supply of caps, but simply don't realize it; tin cans often come in standard sizes of 3 and 4 inches (i.e., coffee). Use tin snips to cut the can off  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches from the bottom. Next cut radial slices about  $\frac{3}{4}$  inches apart and about 1 inch deep; leaving about  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch uncut from the bottom. Carefully straighten the radial "flaps", and slip a large clamp over the cut section to cap off the duct.

### OIL LEAK CURE

When replacing gaskets which are made of paper (front & rear housings, top cover, oil filter adapter, etc), spray them with common aluminum paint; giving them a good soaking. Do this just before assembly, allowing a few minutes drying time so you don't get wet paint all over yourself. The paint seals the pores of the gasket, and fills minute imperfections in the castings as well. The paint also enhances heat transfer between the parts and lessens differential expansion of the parts which leads to bolt loosening.

A useful tool for removing the sending unit is a lawn sprinkler head tool; having a spanner on one end, and a  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch box-end on the other.

## IGNITION SYSTEM DIAGNOSIS -- Why does this thing miss?

I have recently had the experience of diagnosing the ignition system in my Convertible. Now keep in mind that this ignition system is just about as stock as you can get, there are no added "black boxes", or the like. It is as it was designed by GM.

The first indication of problems was a slight hesitation on acceleration during warm up. This would sometimes manifest itself as an occasional miss or as much as multiple cylinders in a row missing, the feeling was just like a too lean of a fuel/air mixture. Sounds like carburation and choke adjustments, right? The next indication was the same type of miss or hesitation on acceleration up a slight hill. The car was fully warmed up at the time as it had just done 5 to 6 miles at 55 MPH. The next day, I used to car to run some errands, went out to the highway and it began to run rough at freeway speeds, something that was new. I exited the freeway and dropped my speed to about 30 to 35 MPH. I ended up pulling into Roy's Western Smorgy in Kennewick. The engine died as I pulled in

I decided to troubleshoot the problem on the spot. It can't be that difficult, now can it? I checked for power to the coil, even jumping past the key to "hotwire" the ignition, no help. I determined that the spark was weak at the coil high voltage lead, this ruled out plugs, high voltage wires, cap, and rotor. Next, I checked the dwell and points. The points were worn badly, but not completely shot. I decided to change them, only to find my new set that I had been carrying was in the 140. I cleaned the points and re-installed them. It seemed to run better, but not correct. I drove to where I work and changed the points out with a modified set of 1960 points. Things seemed to be just fine. After about an hour, I used the car again. It exhibited the same random miss. I parked the car, took care of the errand, and it ran fine. OK, now things are getting strange, new points, power to the coil, could it be a bad coil? Sure acted like it, as the problem was related somewhat to engine temperature. I then changed the coil and things seemed to be fine, I used the car for about 30 miles that day without incident.

The next day was uneventful until evening. After this, things went downhill fast. I went to use the car after it had cooled off for about 3 or 4 hours. It started fine, and was running a little rough, with random missing. That degenerated in about two blocks to missing most of the time, with barely enough power to keep the car rolling at 25 MPH. Now what to change? I changed out the condenser, things seemed to be OK, but in a day or so the problem was back to a lesser degree. Lets sum up what the conditions were: warm dry weather; no rain or other moisture; related to engine temperature, throttle position (sometimes), and disturbing the distributor components; the problem could and sometimes would not be throttle dependent if it was severe enough; the spark was weak and altogether missing whenever the engine would miss.

Do you have it figured out yet? The points depend upon grounding through the breaker plate to complete the primary circuit. The breaker plate rides on three nylon buttons that also provide electrical insulation as well as a sliding surface for the vacuum advance. The ONLY real "reliable" path for the primary current is through the breaker plate pivot. When this gets a little dirty and loose (After 90,000 miles of use since major teardown, what do you expect?) the current will get interrupted at the wrong time, resulting in poor output from the coil. The solution was to solder a flexible piece of wire across the breaker plate halves to provide a reliable ground for the points.

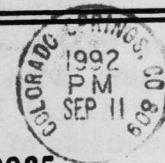

Mix the dry ingredients thoroughly with a 1962 forward control 3-speed shift lever, using the full shift pattern. Blend in melted grease. Add windshield washer fluid while continuing to stir. Spoon into two 8-inch "500" hubcaps. Garnish with O-rings and place on pre-heated turbocharger. Bake at 3500 RPM until O-rings are brittle. Place on oil pans and serve.

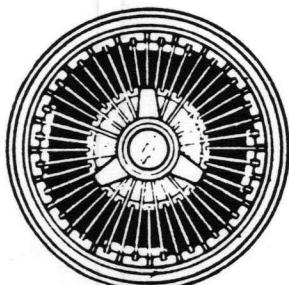
### Sure grip, no slip

By wrapping an old leather belt around a spin-on oil filter and threading the end of the belt through the buckle, you will be able to remove even the most stubborn of filters that conventional filter wrenches won't touch.

The harder you pull, the tighter the grip. The long length of the belt also allows for extra leverage and can be routed to a clear, remote area where an assistant can also help pull on an over-tightened or 'stuck' filter. No need to worry about the filter being crushed because pressure is evenly distributed around its entire circumference.

My old, worn out belt may be too small to keep my pants up anymore, but it has not yet found a filter that it can't loosen.

Try this recipe for cleaning up those messy oil spills on your driveway or garage floor.

1. Completely cover the spill with cat litter and grind it in with the sole of your shoe.

Sweep up the litter.

2. Pour enough Coke (or other cola) to cover the area of the spill and work it in with a broom. Add enough cola to keep the area damp for 15 to 20 minutes.

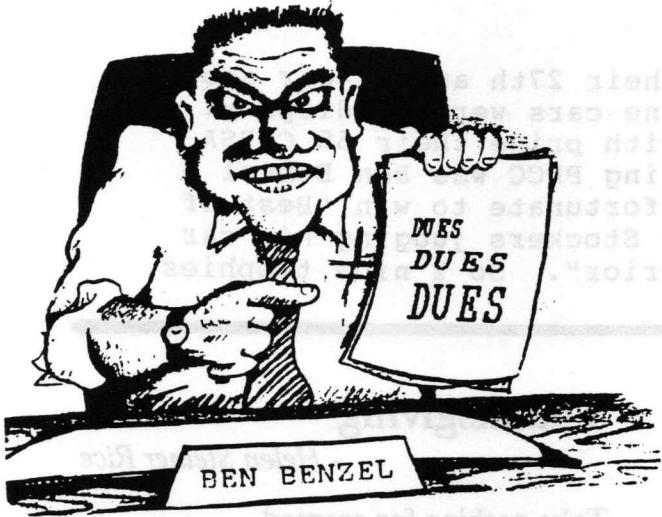

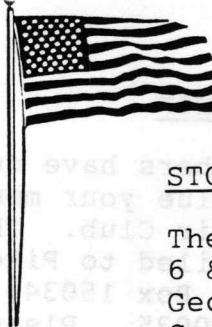

## Petroliana a gas for collectors

Americans addicted to petroliana will travel hundreds of miles and pay thousands of dollars for auto- and oil-company equipment ranging from old gas pumps to grease containers, oil cans and road maps.

Collectors of vintage petroliana have been known to cut holes in their living room ceilings to accommodate a prized pump and globe, according to an article in the current issue of *Country Living*. Some decorate their garages with signs, maps, oil bottles and brass nozzles.

"For a few car collectors, the 'ultimate' is filling your antique vehicle with gas from a vintage pump," said Scott Anderson, an Iowa petroliana collector and dealer.

Anderson called it "a market as volatile as gasoline."

Some petroliana fans specialize in a particular brand or company. Jerry Keyser, Ohio editor and publisher of the bimonthly magazine of the 3,000-member Petroliana Collectors Association, has an almost complete collection of Sunoco road maps as well as artifacts from Sohio, the Standard Oil Co. of Ohio venture financed in 1870 by John Davison Rockefeller.

According to the book *Check the Oil: Gas Station Collectibles and Prices*, by Anderson and his wife, Debbie, automobile drivers in the late 19th century had to fill their tanks from bulk oil stations at the edge of town or smaller in-town suppliers like the local livery stable, blacksmith or general store.

Using a 5-gallon measuring can and gravity, motorists drew off gasoline from above-ground storage drums and then poured the fuel through a funnel directly into their automobile engines.

In 1905, Sylvanus Bowser invented the first pump to dispense either kerosene or gasoline. The same year, what may have been the first drive-in filling station opened in St. Louis.

Generally, unrestored vintage pumps cost \$50 to \$750, although a real devotee may drop \$3,000 for a restored 1920s Fry Model 117 pump, known for its curvaceous shape as the "Mae West Fry."

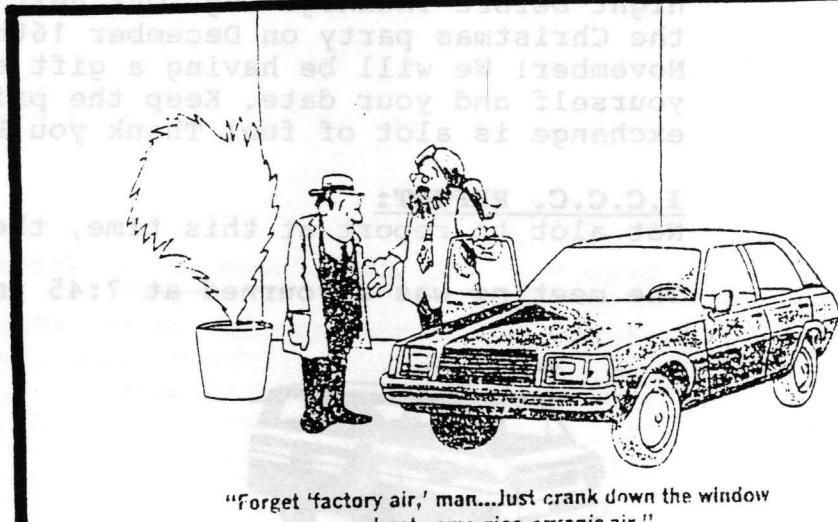
Glass globes are also sought-after collectibles, particularly those with bold graphics, bright colors and designs depicting cars, buffalo, airplanes or American Indians.

Depending on the advertising globe's age, beauty, condition and production numbers, prices range from \$50 to \$4,500.

The intense interest in automotive and petroleum collectibles is one reason why fewer vintage pieces can be discovered on farms or abandoned filling stations along back roads.

Sources for petroliana today are flea markets and auctions as well as fellow collectors and shows specializing in petroliana, antique automobiles and coin-operated machines.

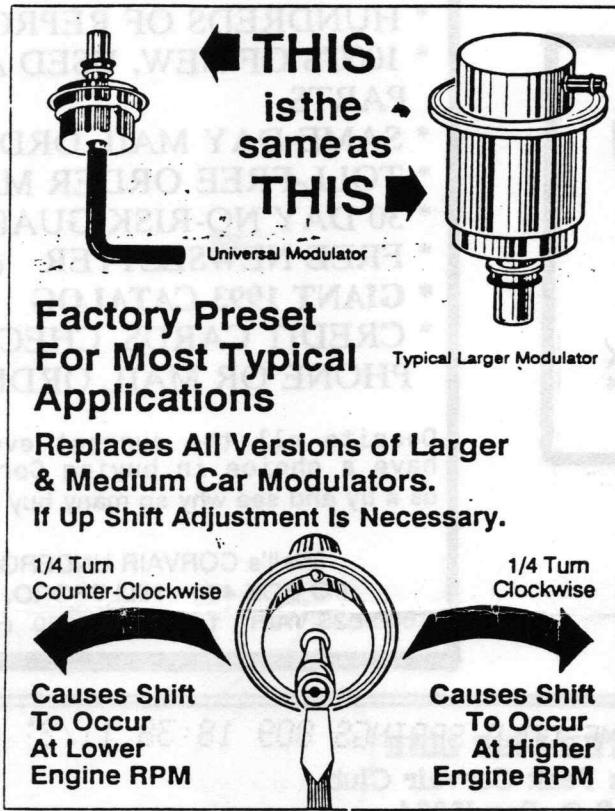

## NEW MODULATOR FOR CORVAIRS WITH POWERGLIDE



Lately, my 1966 Monza Sport Coupe has not been idling correctly, so I checked the hoses on the modulator tube and found that both were in terrible condition. Replaced them and it helped some, but not the way it should be. Decided to replace the modulator. Went to the BIG "A" Auto Parts store here in Hopewell. Here's what I got. The "old" part number for a Corvair modulator was "CX-26," the new part number is: é28738. Below is what also came inside the box, along with the proper modulator gasket.

Want "economy," turn left--want to drag race, turn right. How about this type of "hot rod" modulator? I left mine at factory preset. Works like the original G.M. unit.

## TAIL LAMPS AND FUSES - Vair Force-Bay State Corvairs, Mass.

The tail lamps on early Corvairs and Forward Control operate from the same fuse as the dash lights. The situation is probably not a coincidence, more likely a clever safety gimmick. A blown fuse could be the result of faulty wiring for a trailer light hook-up. Remember -- no dash lights, no tail lights.

## RAIN GUTTER TRIM REMOVAL By Wade Lanning and Corvair Houston

Here's a tip that I saw in a magazine that I tried and found to work on Corvairs. To remove the rain gutter trim without damaging it an old bottle opener (also called a church key) can be used to pry the trim off. I found that using an old wooden pencil between the trim and the bottle opener helped protect the trim and also made the trim easier to remove. One note however, a cheap opener is not strong enough and will bend: It's best to use a good, strong opener.

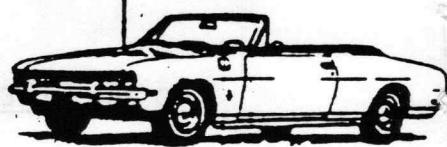

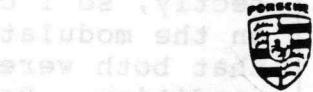
