There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

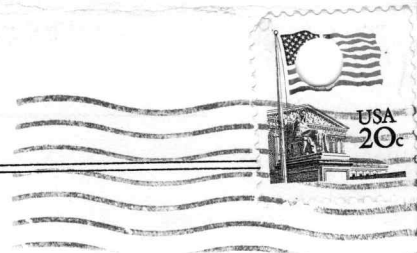

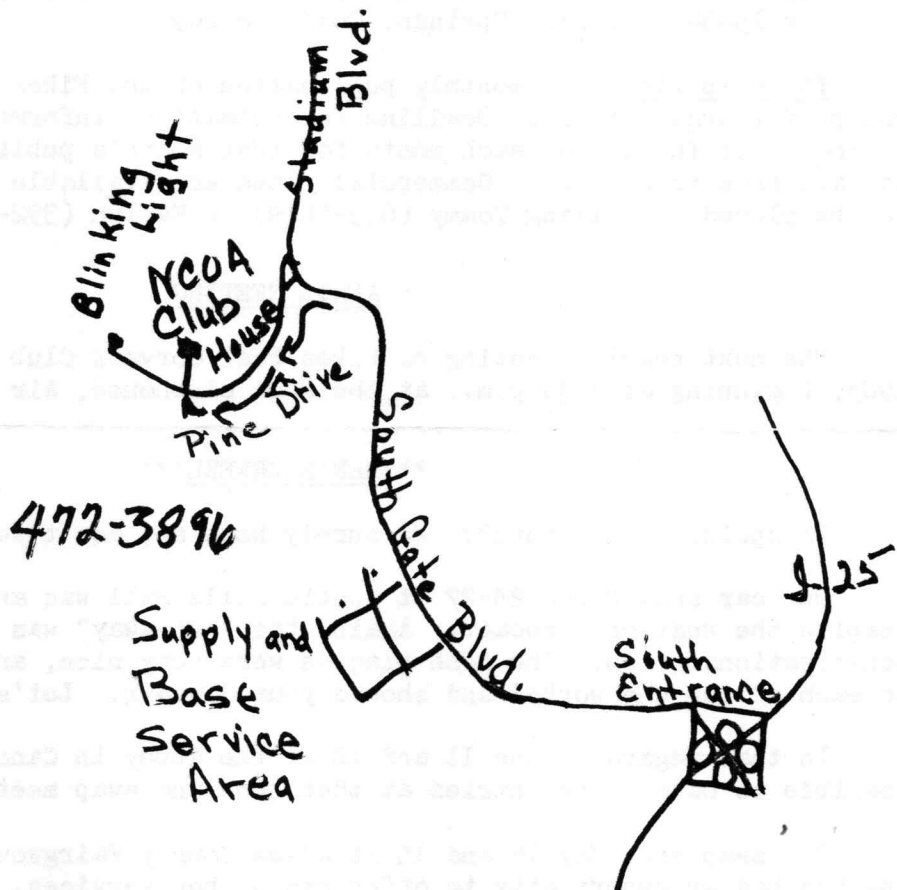

## MEMBER OF THE MONTH

Both Dee and John Glusick are Colorado natives. Born in Pueblo, Dee has lived most of her life there, with short intervals in California, Denver, Colorado Springs, and Trinidad.

She drove her first Corvair in 1963 when she and her husband bought a brand new coupe. The next year they traded for a bigger car with more power.

"Ten years later I traded that husband for a husband that likes Corvairs", said Dee.

Although John was born in Colorado Springs, he was reared in California. His love of cars began early. While in high school he belonged to hot rod clubs. John's first new car was a 1951 Ford club coupe that he street customized. During these days he also built a 1932 Ford roadster street rod.

After graduating from high school, John returned to Colorado. He raced go-carts until the early 1960's.

In 1958 and 1959 John had a "time-out" for military service. He was stationed in San Antonio, Texas, in the Army medical corps. However, he didn't forget his cars. While in San Antonio, he built a Model A two-door sedan street rod.

After his two years in the Army, John once again returned to Colorado where he began working in the sheet metal trade. At this time his love of cars (after the go-cart racing) took the path of restoration and reproduction of antique and classic cars.

He explains that the 1964 Corvair and 1953 Studebaker are milestone cars. It seems that because of special engineering, they are really special!

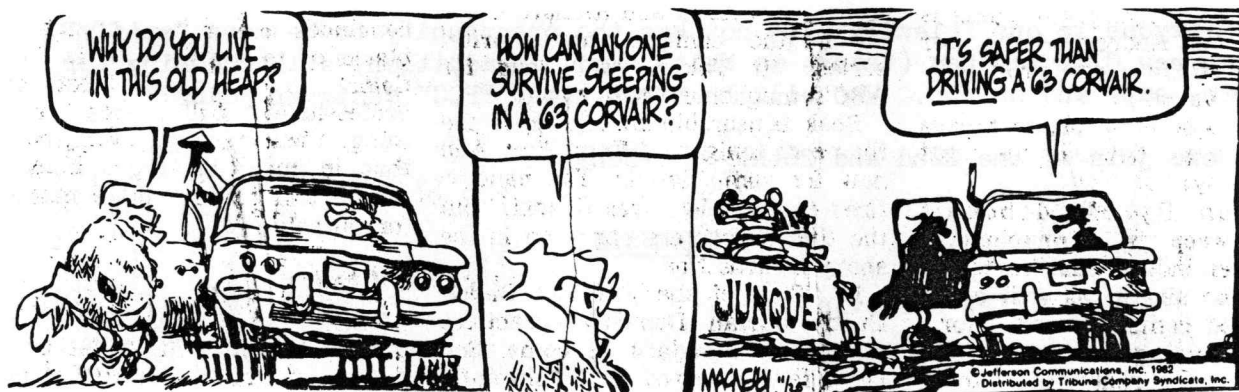
### O.C.C. NEWS

## MINUTES OF THE MEETING

## TECH TIP

### Corvair Batteries

By Bob Goodman, Corvair Houston

Automotive batteries are designed to provide high amperage current for a short time for engine starting. The power used for starting is normally quickly replaced by the engine's alternator or generator, so that in normal use, the battery is always fully charged.

When this type of battery is substantially discharged by excessive cranking, slow drain from accessories, leakage from defective wiring, or lack of use, it loses part of its storage capacity each time it is discharged. After 10 or 12 substantial discharges, a 280 ampere for 30 second battery (OEM Corvair spec) will only be capable of holding a charge which will provide a capacity of 140 amperes for 30 seconds, and no amount of charging will restore this capacity. This gets progressively worse each time the battery is heavily discharged.

Running a battery down trying to start a balky car is just bad news. Before you do that, check for good points and plugs, good battery cables and clean terminals. You can lose a lot of starting power from just loose or dirty connectors. If your car is not driven regularly, get a small trickle charger and leave it connected at all times.

## TECH TIP (Continued)

If you often start engines with problems, get a battery charge with a 100 amp boost capacity to help the battery start the car without excessive discharging. Incidentally, a dry charged battery does not come up to full capacity when the electrolyte is added, but must be fully charged in use or by a battery charger.

Keep your batteries fully charged. This will pay off in easier starting, fewer problems with accessories, and a greatly extended battery life. At the current cost of batteries, this is certainly worth considering.

Jim Wood is well-known not only in the Pikes Peak Region, but throughout "Corvairdom". Having served two years as president of P.P.C.C., Jim is now membership chairman of our Club and vice-president of the National Ultra Van Club.

When the national convention was held in Denver two years ago, Jim successfully directed the planning of a highly attended tour of the Pikes Peak Region. He also helped with the Concours judging during this convention.

His early years were spent in Roswell, New Mexico. After graduation from high school, he did both sales and mechanical work for car dealerships in the Roswell area. He also worked in the public relations department handling new car warranties.

His next endeavor started him in food service. The Phoenix Stewart Infa-red Company hired Jim to be sales manager of their West Texas, New Mexico and East Arizona territory. This company sold infa-red ovens used in snack bars for warming foods. They also made foods for those ovens. There were ten route trucks under Jim's supervision at this time.

In 1973 he and his family moved to Colorado Springs where he took a job with Joslyn Fruit Company. But his love of mechanical things caused him to quit the food service business and become a salesman for Certanium Alloy and Research. This company makes special welding equipment for big machinery.

When Federal Produce was established almost six years ago, Jim joined them and is still with that company.

His great Corvair love began when he found a 1964 blue convertible abandoned behind a gas station. Jim traced the owner, bought the remains, and restored it. (That's the blue convertible now owned by John Koll.)

"Corvairs seem to multiply", says Jim. At one time, on some land owned near Penrose, Jim had between 30 and 40 Corvairs. Now he only owns two and a half Corvairs and a 1929 Franklin which took 15 years to restore.

His Corvairs are a 1966 turbo-charged coupe and a 1968 Ultra Van, lovingly called "The Whale". What's half a Corvair? Well, using a Corvair motor, Jim has contrived a "pusher". This is to help boost The Whale when it is traveling in the mountains and give it extra power on long pulls, etc.

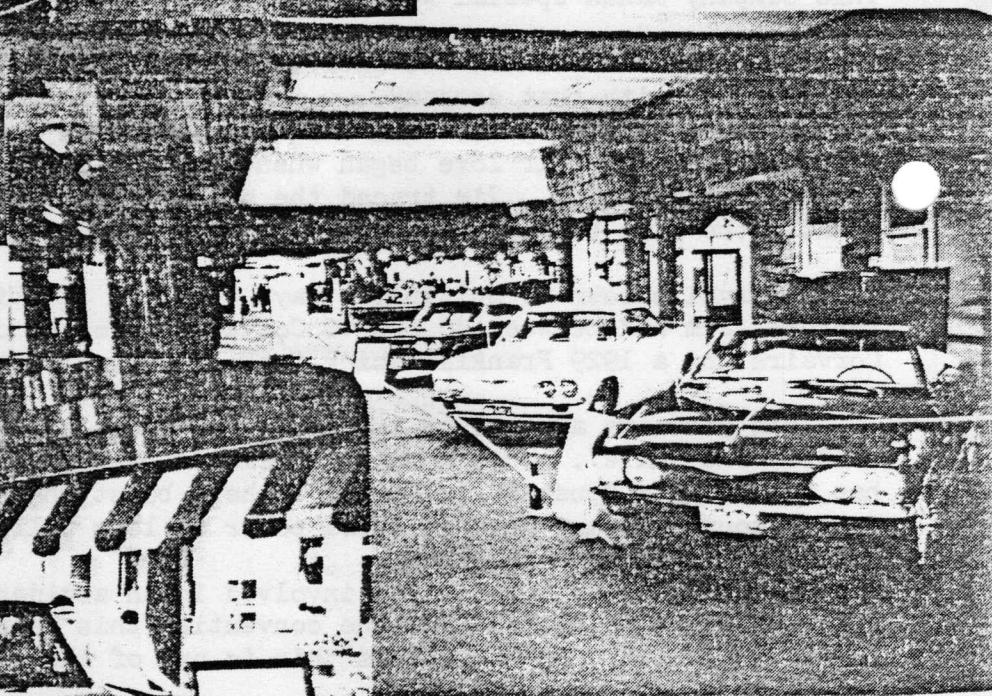
Recently his Ultra Van was involved in an accident, but he plans to have it ready to drive to Seattle for the convention this year. At present he is looking for a windshield. He assures us this is one of the hardest parts to find, but our money's on Jim.

Not only does Jim belong to many food service associations, but he is a member of the H.H. Franklin Club and the VMCCA Club. He presently serves on the Board of Directors of the Colorado Springs VMCCA.

For the past five years he has helped with the planning and execution of the VMCCA swap meet at Phil Long Ford.

Next May he plans to enter his Franklin in "The Great American Race". This race consists of 100 cars built prior to 1941 and all original in stock. They leave Anaheim, California, hoping to average 50 miles an hour for the entire trip to Indianapolis, Indiana. They have specific cities in which they stop at night. Upon arrival in Indianapolis, they get to parade at the Indy 500 and have a box seat for the race. Although the entry fee is \$5,000, there is a prize of \$100,000. Jim plans to use the Whale as his backup car for this race.

After attending a class reunion in Roswell, New Mexico, Jim plans to take his Whale and pusher to Seattle where the mechanics plan to analyze and evaluate his pusher.

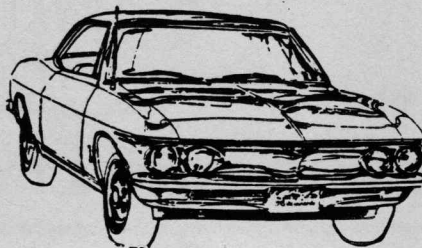
## \*\*\*BEN'S BREEZE\*\*\*
